

New York Commercial Chronicle. NEW YORK, May 19 .- The move-

ment of the crop, as indicated by our telegrams from the South tonight, is given below. For the week ending this evening (May 19), the total receipts have reached 20,-864 bales, against 25,881 bales last week, 34,423 b. les the previous week, and 33,606 bales three weeks since; making the total receipts since the 1st of September, 1881, 4,519,865 bales, against 5,488,448 bales for the same period of 1880-81, showing a decrease since September 1, 1881, of 968,583 bales.


The exports for the week ending this evening reach a total of 53,705 bales, of which 28,201 were to Great Britain, 13,184 to France, and 12,320 to the rest of the Continent, while the stocks as made up this evening are now 483,763 bales.



To-day the market was quiet, middling uplands closing at 121c.




