All south of Bladen and Moore streets and north of the following line: Beginning at the River, thence up Campbell street to Fourth Cross street, thence east with Red Cross to Rankin street, and thence with Rankin street to the eastern limits of the City, to constitute and be known as the Second Division of the First Ward, with the Polling Place at the New Market, orner of Fourth and Campbell streets. THIRD DIVISION-FIRST WARD
