These attacks have been made on the little white girls. Yesterday evening, however, a party of school children were attacked by these colored boys in a manner more outrageous and unbearable than ever, and brought on a conflict between the colored gang and the white boys of the graded school, who were following the girls some distance behind and were not seen by the colored rowdies until they had begun their attack on the girls. The white boys came to the rescue and had a right sharp little fight with the rowdies, finally putting them all to flight.
