FOREIGN. Proclamation of Russian Revolutionists—The Triple Alliance Against France—Cabinet Rumors from Paris—Excitement in the London Rice Market—Queen Victoria—The British Parliament—Mr. Low's Speech at the Lord Mayor's Banquet, &c.

LONDON, April 3.—The Daily News has received from St. Petersburg via Berlin, that the revolutionary party in Russia has issued a proclamation announcing that their preparations to meet the coronation of the Czar are complete, and that they have every hope of success in fully carrying out their long-desired plans.

ROME, April 3.—A denial comes from official government sources of the statement that a defensive triple alliance has been entered into with Italy, Germany and Austria on one side and against France on the other.

PARIS, April 3.—Rumors that Cabinet changes are imminent continue to be circulated. The President has telegraphed to the Minister of Finance, who is at present in Algeria, to curtail his visit and return to France.

BELIN, April 3.—The Reichstag assembled to-day. The President, in his opening address, stated that during the recess of the Chamber a large number of donations for the relief of the flood sufferers along the Rhine had been received, and that most of them had come from America.

PARIS, April 3.—Five of the socialists who signed placards calling a public meeting for the 9th of last month and urging resistance to the act of interference by police, were to-day convicted of having incited the riots which occurred on that date, and were sentenced to three years imprisonment each.

LONDON, April 3.—The Queen has not yet recovered her complete health, and still finds discomfort from her recent accident. She is not, however, confined to the palace, and drives out regularly, although unable to walk.

Lord Randolph Churchill's letter, asserting the right of Lord Salisbury to the leadership of the Tory party, is a theme of much comment in parliamentary and political circles.

Mr. Lowell, U. S. Minister, replying to a toast to Foreign Ministers, said that the relations between England and America were never more cordial than at the present moment. This assertion was received by the company with warm marks of approval.
