#### THE STORM.

A Terrific Rain and Wind Storm Yesterday. One of the severest rain and wind storms prevailed here yesterday that has been quently had harder blows, but considering

known for many years. We have frethe long continuance of the gale and the immense flood of rain with which it was accompanied, it was a storm long to be remembered.

The wind, as we learned upon application at the Signal Office, obtained to a velocity of thirty-eight miles per hour. The rainfall from 10.10 a. m. to 3 p. m. aggregated 3.96 inches, and from 3 p. m. Friday to 3 p.m. yesterday it amounted to 4 inches; which is a very heavy rainfall.

We hear of no serious damage done. We understand that none of the government wires were prostrated. Several trees were uprooted and quite a number of broken limbs were noticed on the streets. There washes in the streets, which were almost impassable in places, the rain fell in such torrents.

On Market street the stores were more or less flooded.
