Improvements to the Front Street Methodist Church.

We took a look vesterday at the improvements in the Front Street Methodist Church. They are many and striking. There is little in the present appearance of the interior of the building to remind one of its looks before the work of improvement was commenced. It would be difficuit to give any one a correct idea of what has been done. The centre aisle has been enlarged a foot, and the side aisles have been put next to the walls, throwing the two rows of seats together on each side. The galleries have been narrowed to the extent of three feet on each side, which gives the room an enlarged appearance. Overhead is heautifully ceiled and pannelled and the stairways have been changed so as to make a more convenient entrance and exit. The sitar has been remodeled to correspond with the changed condition of things and the arches in the vestibule have been extended. Handsome wainscotting adorns the lower part of the walls, which latter have been repainted and polished. Two reflectors, of Finck's pattern, have been suspended from the ceiling, and, to complete the new outfit a fine pipe organ will be added, the whole to cost about \$3,000. The propriety of painting the exterior of the edifice is being considered, and when all the work has been done and all the changes and improvements completed it will be one of the handsomest church edi

fices in the State. Messrs. G. M. Altaffer, Col. C. L. Grafflin and Capt. R. S. Radcliffe, con stitute the Building Committee; Mr. G. M. Altaffer superintended the work and Mr. C. C. Parker did the painting. The pews and window-seats and facings are to be painted yet. Rev.
