PRESBYTERIAN SYNOD.

The Body Convened at the First Church—Opening Sermon by Rev. Dr. Hill—The Roll of Delegates—Election of Moderator, &c. (Special Star Report.)

The Synod of North Carolina convened according to adjournment in the First Presbyterian Church of this city last evening, at 7:30 o'clock. A large congregation assembled and waited on the opening exercises with evident enjoyment. ...

The opening sermon was preached by the last Moderator present, Rev. Dr. Hill, the text being from Jonah, iii: 3: "Arise; go to Nineveh, that great city, and preach to it the preaching that I bid thee." ...

After an introduction showing how God by rebuke compels His servants to do the work He assigns—illustrated by Lot, and David, and Elijah and Jonah—he then announced his theme as suggested by the text, (1) the character of the minister; (2) the message of the minister, and (3) the mission of the minister. ...

Clinton, Sampson county was selected as the place for the next meeting of Presbytery, and Wednesday night before the third Sunday in April as the time. ...
