WASHINGTON.

Immigration Report for October-Testimony Bafare the Protons Court of Inquiry - Recommendations of the Lighthouse Buard. (By Telegraph to the Morning Star.)

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14.-Forty-eight thousand, eight hundred and sixty-five immigrants arrived in the United States in

The examination of Lt. Garlington, before the Proteus Court of Inquiry, was re-sumed this morning. He testified that the erew of the Protous was not selected from the best class of Newfoundland sealers; but the character of the men did not interfere with the result of the expedition. He understood by his instructions that he was to go as far as he could, and if he did not reach Greely, make a depot of supplies as he came back. He went south in the boats, hoping to meet the Yantic and come back in order to make the depot, and himself and men to spend the winter. To have landed his stores at Littleton Island on the way north would have consumed sixty or seventy hours. The delay might have been disastrous and it was considered best to push northward with the conditions were favorable. The instructions were to take

advantage of every favorable lead.

Gen. W B. Hazen, chief dignal officer, took the stand and narrated the circumstunces and conditions under which the Greely expedition and subsequent expeditions were fitted out and dispatched. Fire in Mailroad Warshouses at Norfulls-7,000 Bales of Cotton and Other Property Bestroyed - Loss \$100,000.

Nonrock, Nov. 14 -A fire broke out in a fouight warehouse of the Norfolk & Westers Railroad depot to day, and rapidly exisnded to enother freight Bouse, consuming 7,000 bales of cotton, 30 car loads of lumber, 12 cars and a quantity of miscelaneous freight. The wharves of the company were badly damaged and for a while the fire threatened everything in the neighborhood with destruction. The Navy Yard and Portsmouth five engines came to the assistance of the local force, and the fire is now under control. The loss is estimused as \$500,000, covered by insurance.
