He gives his reasons for repealing the internal revenue laws. He professes to have no objection to the whiskey tar, but his main object is to get rid of the Revenue Bureau. The STAR has always fought the Ring and favored its abolition. Keep the tax but change the manner of collecting. Here is what Senator But-

My principal object, however, is to get rid of the internal revenue bureau, with its of informers and blackmailers. Whiskey can be taxed without the existence of the internal revenue bureau. So far as I am personally concerned, you may put a tax of \$10 a gailon on whiskey, but you can do this without the bureau. This is the institution I am after.

How would you collect the taxes? Through the customs officers. This orce would have to be increased somewhat, but the army of spies who have been fragonning the Southern people, harrying and bedeviling, blackmailing and harrassing some of our most reputable merchants sell a cigar or a plug of tobacco, no personal objection to the tax on whis-Put it as high as you please, but colect it through the customs department of the treasury. The Remedy for Tramps. The new Code contains some very strict and important laws in regard to tramps and vagrants. Chapter sixty-three, volume two, of the Code, save that any person going about from place to place, begging and subsisting on charity, shall be considered a tramp, and punished by imprisonment in the county jail for six months. Tramps, when found in any person's yard or house, may be arrested by anybody without a warrant and carried before a magistrate; the party making the arrest to be entitled to the same fee as a sheriff

THE WEATHER.

Heavy Snow Storm-The Approaching Cold Wave-State of the Thermometer in Different Directions, de. de.

Yesterday afternoon, shortly after clock, rain commenced falling here and continued until about a quarter past 2 o'clock, when it suddenly changed to snow, During the forenoon reports had reached here of heavy snows up the Wilmington Weldon and Carolina Central Roads, but it was generally supposed that Wilmington would do as usual-take her share in rain. Thicker and thicker came down the fleecy particles, until the whole atmosphere was almost one solid mass of snow flakes. It is a very rare thing indeed for people in this latitude to witness such a snow as that of yesterday, and the consequence was that nearly all of the founder portion of the community, and some of the older, ran wild with enthusiasm over the beautiful sight. At first it seemed as if it would all melt as fast as it touched the ground, but finally, as the storm increased in severity. the flakes began to accumulate, and once having gained a footbold, the tops of the houses and eventually the streets and yards were covered with the white mantle which so seldom adorns them in this particular

A while before night the snow suddenly stopped falling, and the streets were quickly thronged with snow-ballers, who were hurling chilly missiles in every direction and waging a war against all pedestrians who happened to venture within firing distance of their "picket lines."

At the Signal office we were informed by Mr. Haney that a bitter cold wave had struck the North and West and that we might look out for it during the night, though in a somewhat moderated form. At Bismarck the mercury in the thermometer was 31 degrees below zero; in Chicago, 18 degrees below; at St. Louis, 18 degrees below; at Omaha, 24 degrees below; at Cincinnati, 8 degrees below; at Nashville, 2 degrees below; at Memphis, 2 degrees be low. Fort Macon reported sleet and hail at 3 p m., and Smithville reported a heavy snow at 3 p. m. Charleston reported bail, and the thermometer at 29. At Charlotte the temperature was 21, at Montgomery

21 and at Mobile 29. We have not had such a snow here in a long time. If the ground had been dry and hard it would have been much deeper. The last heavy snows (for this latitude) occurred here on the 19th of November, 1879 and the 24th of January, 1881.




