

An Earthquake Shock Distinctly Felt in Wilmington and at Beaufort.

What is generally conceded to have been the shock of an earthquake was distinctly felt in this city yesterday morning, about 8 o'clock, and was the theme of conversation during the day. Many dwellings were shaken very perceptibly, and in some instances to an extent to create alarm. We heard of one gentleman who became impressed with the idea that the foundations of his house were giving away. Another party states that he was in a close room at the time, and that the concussion was sufficient to agitate articles of clothing hanging in the room. In some instances crockery and glassware were made to rattle by the force of the shock, which was not confined office as follows: to any particular part of the city. Some of the older people say they have heard and felt earthquake shocks before, but none so perceptibly as this. Some persons say the shock was accompanied by a rumbling sound, and one or two declare that they felt two or three distinct shocks. The main shock lasted from eight to ten seconds. Confirmatory of the reality of the shock we have a report, through the Signal office here, from the Signal Service observer at Fort Macon, in this State, to the effect that a shock of an earthquake was felt at Beaufort, N. C., between 7.50 and 8 o'clock.






