Serious Acoldent Bofalls a Good Cittmen-A Terrible Ordeal of Suspense and Patn.

norning by the announcement that Mr. Alex. Johnson, one of our most esteemed citizens, had met with a serious, if not dangerous, accident. It appears from what we can gather that he was engaged in counting a quantity of casks of spirits turpentine, at his yard on the west side of the river, the casks being some three or four tiers high, when, as he approached the edge, a cask tipped under his weight, precipitating him to the ground, where, as he lay prostrate, two of the casks fell upon him and pinioned him so securely that he could not move hand of foot. He wayed to call for help, and, though there were two men within about fifteen feet of him, he could not make himself heard. Maffittshappened to pass that way and discovered the horrible condition of Mr. Johnson, with the life being pressed out of his body by the heavy barrels, and took measures for his immediate relief. The injured gentleman was then brought to this side of the river and conveyed in a carriage to his residence on the corner of Sixth and Walnut streets, where the requisite surgi-

cal assistance was immediately summoned. At last accounts it was understood that no bones were broken and it was hoped that no serious internal injury had been suffered by the patient. He was in fearful pain, however, and morphine had to be freely administered. We learn that Mr. Johnson received severe bruises about the head, face and breast, and that his right shoulder was supposed to be dislocated. The accident happened about 9 o'clock, and a number of business men and friends of the unfortunate gentleman have called at his residence during the day to learn his condition and ascertain the extent of his injuries, as well as to express their sympa-
