At Burton Hicks', two miles distant, a six-room dwelling, two stories high, was carried for ty feet, flooring and sills, and thrown against a barn, demolfshing both house and barn. Trees were blown 100 yards, and every tree, save one, in his orchard was blown down. Great trees were blown 200 feet. Geo. W. Finch's kitchen, barn, horse stables, smoke house and a tenant house and four stacks of fodder were destroyed, and a part of the chimney of his dwelling knocked down. Jackson Perry's dwelling was level-ed with the ground and, strange to say, no one was injured. Parker Morgan's colored) house was blown down and a five year old child was blown out of bed into the yard and instantly killed. Joel Lamm was one of the greatest sufferers. His wife received serious wounds which, it is feared, will prove fatal. Yancey Glover's place was in the immediate track of the storm and everything was utterly demolished. All the houses on the place were blown down, but beyond bruises, no one was injured. Tobias Joyner was thrown out of his house and hurled against a tree thirty five yards distant, and the counterpane which was his only article of clothing, was orn into shreds. His injuries though painful are not serious. Nick Pace lost everything he had. H. Finch (colored) lost every thing he had. His trunk, containing five dollars, was blown away and neither has yet been found. Mrs. Mildred Deans had all of her houses blown down, and some of her sheep and chickens were killed. All of Robert H. Batchelor's houses were blown down and his furniture lost or badly damaged. Henry C. Williams' two-story house was completely demolished and no one was hurt. Everything on Joe Denton's place was swept away.
