M. Pasteur, in a communication to the Paris Academy of Sciences, says that he had rendered twenty dogs proof against hydrophobia by inoculating them with other virus than the virus of rabies. Fowls and pigeons injected with the latter became affected, but soon recovered spontaneously. By injecting virus of rabies into the region of the skull of dogs the same acute disease was produced; if injected into the veins only a chronic affection followed and without ferocity.

Loss about \$4,000, no insurance. — Raleigh Visitor: The fourteen-month-old son of Mr. Robert O. King had the middle finger of his left hand all most torn off on Sunday afternoon last, by being caught in the top of the baby carriage as it was being let down. — Salisbury Examiner: We are glad to hear that our people are turning their attention to the cultivation of tobacco rather than to cotton as a crop for revenue. — At Davie Court last week Congressional aspirants were as thick as hair on a dog's back. — Greensboro Bugle: On last Wednesday a white female child was born in Washington township, in this county, having four eyes, two noses and two mouths. The child only lived a short while, which is, no doubt, a great relief to its parents. — Boston Post: Rutherford, N. C., has a man 5 feet 10 inches tall. He is said to be the tallest man in the State. He has fought over fifty different men for asking him "Is it cold up there?" and he didn't begin until he got sick of hearing the question. — Lumberton Robinsonian: The doctors say that there has been less sickness this year than ever before, in fact it is distressingly healthy. — While at Shoe Heel last Monday afternoon we saw one of the Crofters, Mr. McIntosh, a remarkably handsome and intelligent gentleman. — New Bern Star: A schooner, M. R. Lane shipped to-day per schooner M. R. Lane, for New Bern, at 10 o'clock. Beansport county, between 300 and 300 barrels oyster shells to be burned for a lime fertilizer. — A cargo of sacked corn changed hands in our market to-day at 66 cents per bushel. — Among the killed in the late awful mine disaster in Virginia was a man by the name of Hampton, who was foreman of the night men. He was about thirty-two years of age and a native of North Carolina. He leaves a wife and three children. He came to Pocahontas from Ore Knob, Smyth county, Va. — Asheville Advance: At a party last night, near 12 o'clock, a colored man named Bob Hemphill, three times in the side, and near the region of the heart. At the time of writing, Hemphill was regarded as fatally shot and not supposed to live. Whiskey was at the bottom of the affair. — Concord Times: The wheat and oats crops are looking splendidly in this section and the prospect for a large yield is at present very encouraging. — Material for the new Methodist parsonage is being laid on the ground, and in a short time work will be begun on the building. — A young man suddenly died of heart disease on Saturday, the 1st inst., near Edin's Mills, Stanley county. — Salem Press: We regret to learn that S. STATE EXPOSITION.

Meeting at the Produce Exchange Rooms Yesterday—Addresses of President Primrose and Others—Resolutions, &c. In accordance with the announcement made in the daily papers, a joint meeting of the Chamber of Commerce, Produce Exchange and Board of Trade, together with citizens generally, was held at the rooms of the Produce Exchange at 12:30 o'clock yesterday, for the purpose of hearing from President Primrose and Secretary Fries of the State Exposition, and Mr. S. G. Worth, Fish Commissioner of the State. The meeting was called to order by Col. Roger Moore, President of the Produce Exchange, on whose motion Mr. C. H. Robinson was designated as Chairman. The Chairman called on Mr. W. S. Primrose to explain the object of the meeting. That gentleman came forward and in an address of some fifteen or twenty minutes in length fully set forth the objects and aims had in view by the projectors of the proposed State Exposition, what had been accomplished towards making it a success, and the benefits which would be sure to follow to the State at large from such an exhibition of the boundless resources of North Carolina as it was in the power of the State to make. He alluded to the recent exposition at Boston, in which North Carolina bore such a conspicuous and honorable part, and to the great and lasting benefits our State derived from such an attractive exhibition of our resources as was there brought to the attention of the people of the United States. This favorable exhibit, he thought, could not only be maintained, but improved upon, in our State Exposition, in which each county would have the privilege of taking a part and in which a friendly rivalry would only tend to promote and insure a more magnificent success. He called attention to the plans which had been decided upon to make the proposed Exposition come up to the requirements of the occasion and accomplish the great end it had in view. It was particularly desired that every county in the State should be represented by such of its products as would be best calculated to give the people an idea of its capabilities and possible resources, such products or articles to be in charge of men willing to bring them properly to the attention of the large number of visitors expected to be present. The State Agricultural Fair grounds have been secured for the Exposition and the platform buildings suitable for the purposes for which they are to be used are already in course of erection. Proper arrangements for storage, for the accommodation of visitors and for other purposes are being made, and nothing will be lacking that it is possible to provide for the convenience and accommodation of visitors and exhibitors. President Primrose made a very favorable impression upon the business men present by his speech, which was delivered in a colloquial style. Mr. Worth, our Fish Commissioner, followed in a short but comprehensive address, in which he alluded to the importance of our fishing interests being properly represented in the Exposition. Mr. Fries also spoke briefly. The meeting then voted unanimously to ask the Board of County Commissioners to appropriate a sum, not exceeding \$500, to be used immediately in forwarding the interests of New Hanover county in the Exposition; should this sum prove inadequate, to increase the amount as the exigencies of the case may demand through a joint meeting with the Board of Magistrates. Mr. D. G. Worth then offered the following preamble and resolutions which were adopted: WHEREAS, Believing that the Exposition to be held in the city of Raleigh will be highly beneficial to the whole State of North Carolina, we feel it both a duty and privilege to do what we can to further the efforts which are being put forth to make it a complete success. Resolved, That a committee of three, consisting of Messrs. Charles H. Robinson, J. H. Currie and B. F. Hall, be appointed to accompany the representatives of the Exposition now in the city, Messrs. Primrose and Fries, in waiting upon our citizens for private subscriptions. Supreme Court.
