PIRST SESSION.

Putition for Harbor Improvements at Pensacols-The Naval Appropriation mill Considered in the Senate-Territorial Bills in the House. (by Telegraph to the Morning Star.)

SENATE.

WASHINGTON, April 8 -Mr. Call prosented a petition from the Board of Trade of Pensacola, Fla., relating to the necessity of harbor improvements at that piece. Mr. Call commended the petition to the careful consideration of the committee on Com-merce, to which it was referred. There is a bar rapidly forming in the harbor of Penencola, Mr. Call said, which would soon become a serious obstacle to commerce if not provided against.

The regular order at 2 o'clock was the bill to provide for a uniform system of bankruptcy throughout the United States, but it was laid aside for the naval appro-priation bill. Many of the documents proposed by the Senate appropriation commit-The provisions relating to ordinance were reached and several senators spoke upon the lack of guns in this country of sufficient power or insufficient number to avail the United States in a contest with any one of a down maritime powers of the world. There was a general concurrence of sentiment that something should be done at once to provide suitable ordinance, and Mr. Hale gave notice of the amendments to be hereafter moved, appropriating a total of \$1,750,000 for the purchase and erection of a plant for making heavy cannon.

Pending a speech by Mr. Vest upon the subject, the Senate went into executive session, and when the doors were reopened

### ---OHIO.

Municipal Elections - Success of the Democratic Ticket in Cincinnati-Reports from Other Towns. (By Tolograph to the Morning Star

CINCINNATI, April 8. - The Seventeenth Regiment left the city this morning and the jail is now unprotected by military. A datail of fifty extra policemen under Lieut. Langdon, in charge of a Gatling gun, will assist the sheriff, and the First Regiment of militia will remain in readiness for a call. Returns for Cincinnati of yesterday's election were not all reported at noon today; but enough is known to show the total vote to be about 40,000. Police Clerk Richard's (Republican) majority will be from 400 to 700, and it is possible that the Republicans will elect one member of the Board of Education. With these exceptions the entire Democratic ticket is elected by majorities of from 400 to 900. Returns show very large Republican gains in the German wards, compared with a year ago, the change is enormous. There was a general lack of interest among the leaders of parties and the vote shows more spontaneous action than is usual in elections. The only active workers were the candidates for the police court. The municipal reform ticket, though nominally the work of both parties, it is generally understood has drawn most of its votes from the Republicans. If it had not been before the people, the result would have been less favorable

Throughout the State reports show Republicus gains in most of the larger cities. Springfield shows a considerable Democratic gain. Reports are generally silent upon the subject of gain or loss, as focal iscure influence the vote in most places. ---

## GEORGIA.

Reeting of the White Man's Republican Party at Atlanta - Business Pailure at Savannah.

He said that the white man and negroes should not have conventions together. They would have to work to a common end, but separately. Wm. Markham was elected permanent chairman. The attendance was about twenty. Gen. James Longstreet, U.S. Marshal for this District, was present and participated.


