For the Middle Atlantic States, light

central portions and slight fall in tempera-

ern portions.

For the South Atlantic States, slightly

cooler and fair weather, northwest to south-

west winds and higher barometer.

For the West Gulf States, fair weather,

winds shifting to northerly, higher bar-

ometer and slight fall in temperature.

For the East Gulf States, fair weather,

north to east winds, higher barometer and

slight change in temperature.

For Tennessee and the Ohio Valley,

rain, followed by clearing weather and

northwesterly winds, higher barometer and

slight rise in temperature.

PENNSYLVANIA.

A Murderer Hanged at Easton.

EASTON, April 8.—John Dillman was

hanged here to-day for the murder of his

wife. He marched to the scaffold with a

steady step, and was unmoved almost to

the last. He began to cry after the benedi-

ction, but after the black cap was drawn

over his face he remained motionless until

the drop fell. There were only a few

slight quiverings of the body and in twelve

minutes he was dead.
