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THE CITY.

Wilmington has been greatly bereaved in the deaths of Major D. J. Devane and Mr. Alexander Sprunt. They were both men of singularly pure lives and of manly motives and principles.

At a joint meeting of the Chamber of Commerce and Produce Exchange, held yesterday at 12 M., to take some suitable action in connection with the death of the late Alexander Sprunt, member of the two bodies, the same was called to order by Col. Roger Moore, President of the Produce Exchange, who stated the object of the meeting and spoke of the high esteem in which the deceased was held.

During the absence of the committee Col. J. L. Cantwell made a few well-timed and appropriate remarks. When the committee on resolutions returned, Mr. W. Calder for the committee, in a few remarks presented the following preamble and resolutions, which were unanimously adopted:

Ripe in years, abundant in good works, and all of honor, Alexander Sprunt, the honest merchant, the faithful citizen, the good man, has been called to his last account. For more than thirty years he has gone in and out among us, pursuing with steadfast purpose and with no other view than the calling of an honorable mercantile career, and achieving that success which probity, industry and unswerving integrity always deserve, but do not always win; he has left a record which may well serve as an incentive to those who follow after and a proud heritage to those who are left to carry on his work and perpetuate his name.
