The interests of the people could be best subserved by letting the tariff laws alone for the present. There was no call coming up for a change in these laws, if the demand of the Free Trade Club of Brooklyn were excepted. This bill was brought in as a challenge to fight in the coming Presidential campaign. The Republican party, the protective party, accepted the chal lenge. It stood ready to go to the people, standing by the policy of tariff law so ad justed as to give revenue to government and protection to American industries.

He believed in getting reveaus generally from importations, but legislation should not be enacted which would make the rich richer and the poor poorer, upon the pretence of elevating American labor above the pauper labor of Europe. and of keeping the home market for our selven. Cofigress should so legislate as ultimately to reach the revenue standard. This could not be done at once, for a sudden change of policy might produce disas-ter. Progress should be slow. Five, ten, twenty yours might be needed to accom pliah the object, yet it must be done. The struggle would be flerce and arduous, man ufacturers would sucrifice political alliance and use every device to hold what they had. It was the daily observation that if the Democratic party did not abandon ils attempt to revise the tariff it could not elect the President. It was said that manufacturers were a power in their wealth, and that this would be used against the party affectively. If on such suggestions, the Democratic party abandon ed its policy, the time would come when fairor representatives would be sent to Congress to resume the contest. The party which held power hereafter must do so by outstripping its opponent on the reduction of the tartif. The pending bill was liable to apporal criticiams. It was claimed that it did not correct the inequalities in the mariff. The committee had not undertaken to do that. It had been thought best to make a simple and partial reduction of taxation, that multiplicity of subjects would tend to create confusion in the public mind. The reduction of the revenue which would he accomplished by the bill was estimated at \$30,000,000, and this opened the way to the reduction of the tax on distilled spirits to tan cents per gallon and encourage farm ers to put in brandy that which by decay would otherwise be lost. It would also enable Congress to abolish the entire to barres tax.


