The Fire Yesterday Morning.

Fire broke out yesterday morning, about half-past 2 o'clock, in the store on the northeast corner of McRae and Gwynn (or Walnut) streets, owned by Mr. Martin Rathjen and occupied by Mr. C. H. Capps hour it was some time before the alarm got started, and the building was entirely destroyed. A one-story dwelling on the north, occupied by Jos. McNeill, colored, also owned by Mr. Rathjen, was badly damaged on the side next to the fire. Mr. Capps, who was sleeping in the store, was awakened by the flames, which were then attaining considerable headway, while the smoke was stifling. He got out as best he could, and his entire stock was consumed. It is supposed that the fire was caused by a lamp explosion. The policeman on that beat says he passed the store and tried the door at 2 a. m., when all was right.

Mr. Rathjen had insurance on the store to the amount of \$200, in the Wilmington Mutual, his loss being about \$50. The dwelling was insured in the same company for \$300, and was damaged to the amount of about \$75 or \$100. His loss in fencing, etc., he estimates at about \$50 more. The adjoining property was saved with one stream from a hydrant near by, to which was attached a portion of the Adrian's hose. Several very handsome shade trees were destroyed. The house adjoining the store on the east, also the property of Mr. Rathjen, was in danger, and a good portion of the fencing was burned. To people down the street the fire bore the appearance of a serious conflagration. The property alluded to was formerly known as the
