

### COTTON.

N. Y. Commercial and Financial Chronicle. NEW YORK, July 11.-The movement of the crop, as indicated by our telegrams from the South to-night, is given below. For the week ending this evening (July 11) the total receipts have reached 7,578 bales, against 4,655 bales last week, 5,-642 bales the previous week and 4,725 bales three weeks since; making the total receipts since September 1st, 1883, 4,794,874 bales, against 5,915,986 bales for the same period of '82-'83, showing a decrease

since Sept. 1, 1883, of 1,121,112 bales. The exports for the week ending this evening reach a total of 40,747 bales, of which 31,180 were to Great Britain, 100 to France and 9,467 to the rest of the Continent, while the stocks as made up this eve ing are now 282,540 bales.

As compared with last week's clo ing there is to-day a decline of 13 points for this crop and 3@ points for the next. Cotton on t spot has been much less active th for some weeks past. Notwithstan ing the rapid reduction that has be going on in our stocks, prices ha been weak. Quotations were duced 1-16c. on Monday and aga on Wednesday, while on Thursd business came quite to standstill. Today there was more doing for home consumption, at steady prices, middling uplands closing at 11c. The total sales for forward delivery for the week are 293,900 bales.
