THE GALLOWS.

Three White Mon Hanged for Arson in Alabama-Sickening Scenes at the Executions of Negro Murderers in Maryland and New York-A Public Hanging at Pine Bluff, Ark. [By Telegraph to the Morning Star.]

SCOTTSBORO, ALA., August 1.—George Smith, Asberry and George Hughes, all white and under 25 years of age, were hanged here at 1 o'clock to-day. They were convicted of burning the house of Henry Porter, on Sand Mountain. It was Henry Porter, on Sand Mountain. It was the first instance of the death penalty being enforced for arson in the first degree in this State. They were all baptized just be-fore they left the jail. George Hughes tried to inflame the crowd by a speech from a jail window and succeeded in creating con-siderable feeling. Smith and Asberry Hughes also made short addresses from a jail window both denving their guilt, but jail window, both denying their guilt, but the former confessing to other crimes. They mounted the gallows with firm steps. At 1 o'clock the drop fell and they died with a few struggles.

CAMBRIDGE, MD., August 1 .- Frederick, alias "Bug" Cephas, (colored) was hanged in private at noon to-day, for the murder of Mrs. Celia Bush Murphy, on the 7th of April last. He made a few remarks, con-April last. He made a few remarks, con-fessing the crime, and prayer being offer-ed, the black cap was adjusted. He bade good bye to his attendants and professed his readiness to die. When the sheriff cut the rope, the cap not having been securely festened on flow off comparison his distorted fastened on, flew off, exposing his distorted features. The scene was sickening. Death resulted in a few minutes from strangulation.

BROOKLYN, N. Y., August 1.-Alex. Jefferson, (negro) who in a jealous rage killed Henry Hicks and Emma Jackson, (also colored) and nearly killed Annie Jackson and slightly wounded his brother, Celestial Jefferson, at Mrs. Jackson's residence, on Buffalo Avenue, Brooklyn, was hanged this morning in the presence of about 400 spectators. Jefferson has claimed all the time that at the time of the commission of the crimes he was insane and therefore was quite willing that surgeons should examine his brain; should they find that he was insane, he said, it would not benefit him any but it would vindicate his lawyer. Shortly after the rope was cut and Jefferson's body shot up into the air, but the knot slipped round under his chin and his neck was not broken. For a moment he was motionless and then he kicked, struggled and groaned as he slowly strangled. By desperate effort s he got his right hand up to the rope and tore the black cap from his face, exposing its contortions and his staring eyes. After he tore the black cap away his hand fell down by his side. The contortions and convulsions of his body continued for about five minutes. Life was pronounced extinct eight minutes after. The body was sent to the morgue. Sr. Louis, Aug. 1.-Frank Williams, colored, who shot and killed his wife Effic in a cotton field last October, and seriously wounded her daughter, was hanged to-day at Pine Bluff, Ark., in the presence of a great crowd. The drop fell at 12.15, and death ensued in about fifteen minutes.

THE NINTH DISTRICT.

LOUISVILLE, August 1.—A special dis-patch from Breckenridge says: A shoot-ing affray occurred near Burn's, in this county, resulting in the instant death of Elisha Alexander, the serious wounding of his brother John, and the severe wounding of Mrs. Charlie Poole-sister of the Alexander boys and wife of one of the shooting party. Charlie Poole had run away with Miss Alexander and bad feeling was en-gendered between the families. The Alex-anders threatened Poole's life. On Saturday, young Poole and wife, accompanied by his brother John, attended a picnic in the neighborhood, and when returning home, in order to cut off some distance, turned into a field on the Alexanders' place and were riding across it when the two Alexanders, young men, espied them from the house and ran down to intercept from the house and ran down to intercept them. The Poole party saw them coming, and having no doubt but that they were about to put their threats against Charlie's life into execution, drew their revolvers, and when the Alexanders came up and be gan abusing them for coming on the place, opened fire. Elisha Alexander received three bullets in the neck, which killed him instantly; John was severely wounded in the hip and lower part of the body, and Mrs. Poole was struck by a wild bullet and severely hurt. The Poole's have not yet been arrested.

FOREIGN.





FIRE RECORD.

Fatalities Attending the Burning of a Six-Story Building in New York-A Furniture Factory and Other Buildings Destroyed in Philadelphia-A Wholesale Drug House Burned in Omaha, Neb. .

[By Telegraph to the Morning Star.] NEW YORK, Aug. 1.—The six-story building No. 89 Water street, the upper stories of which are occupied by two fami-lies, while the rest was devoted to business purposes, caught fire this morning. Five persons were in the building at the time. Bartholomew Keefe, aged 47, janitor, was badly burned about the head and body; Ann Gibbons, aged 29, and her children-George, aged 6, and John, aged 2-were all terribly burned and are now in the hospital. James Gibbons, aged 4, another child, whom the mother was unable to rescue, was burned to death.

PHILADELPHIA, PA., August 1.-Fire broke out this morning in the old rink building No. 23 Chestnut street, occupied by John Wannamaker as a furniture man-urfacturing building. ----A STARTLING STORY.

Murder and Piracy on an American Schooner.

(By Telegraph to the Morning Star.) PHILADELPHIA, PA., August 1,-A startling story that the crew of the schooner Julia Baker, from New York for Point-a-Petre, had mutinied, killed their captain, John Lewis, and have been selling the cargo in the West Indies, led the owners of the vessel, Messrs. Warner & Merritt, to institute inquiry by telegraph. As a result the Collector of Customs at Key West, Fla., now holds in custody the captain and four men of the crew of the Julia Baker, the vessel being now at the latter port. The man arrested as Captain Lewis does not answer the description of the Captain Lewis who took the schooner from New York. The original manifest 18 lost. The owners of the vessel express Cotton. the opinion that mutiny occurred on board the schooner; that a fight took place in which Captain Lewis was killed, and the crew, seeing that they were in for it, determined to sell the cargo and escape.


Mercantile Agency Reports for the Past Week.
