ROME, August 8.—Three fresh cases of cholera are reported at Cairo, Italy, and at Montenotte. There have been two deaths to day at Muss; one at Carignard and one at Ossasio. No fresh cases have appeared at Pancalisri, but two persons who were under treatment there have died.

PANAMA, VIA GALVESTON, August 8 .-The Star and Herald reports that an epidemic of a malignant and pernicious fever is prevailing at San Carlos, a village 38 miles from Panama; nine deaths occurred in from twenty-four to thirty-seven hours, The inhabitants are panic stricken. It is believed that the epidemic is due to intense malarial poisoning. Panama is very sickly -from ten to fifteen funerals occur daily. The heat is intense.

BERLIN, Aug. 8.-A German gunboat is pursuing in the North Sea the English fishing smacks which recently pillaged a prorision cutter from Berlin.

Germany has rejected the proposal of Portugal for an European conference for the discussion of the question concerning the Congo country.

BRUSSELS, Aug. 8.—The Chamber of Deputies to day adopted, by a vote of 73 to 44, a bill providing for the renewal of diplomatic relations with the Vatican.

BERNE, August 8.-The Peace Conference closed its sessions to day. Before its final adjournment it adopted a motion favoring the neutralization of the Panama Inter-Oceanic Canal.

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


