THE ARCTIC HORROR.

More affirmations that the Greely survivors ate the flesh of their dead comrades. (By Telegraph to the Morning Star.)

New York, August 15.—Third Officer Kelly, of the relief steamer Bear, to-day was asked if he had read the reports about the eating of the flesh of Lieut. Kisingbury and private Henry. "Yes, I read the reports, and they are true."

Detroit, August 15.—C. L. Clark, guardian of the children of Lieut. Kisingbury, in an interview this morning, said: "I thought to such a point of starvation, I think the unfortunate men would have been thoroughly justified in eating their dead comrades."

MEXICO.

Discovery of a Plot to Depose the President of the Republic and Assassinate Party Leaders.

St. Louis, Aug. 15.—A special telegram from the City of Mexico, to the Globe Democrat, says: A conspiracy against the government has been discovered here, embracing a plot to depose President Gonzalez, and put in his place Jose Maria Iglesias, and to assassinate Gen. Diaz and all leaders of what is known as the Tuxtepec party.

POLITICAL.

Nominations of Congressional Candidates.—The Dead-Lock in the Democratic Convention of the Second District of Maryland.

DAYTON, O., August 15.—The Fourth District Republican Congressional Convention yesterday nominated Lewis B. Guickeil for Congress.

ROME, IND., August 15.—The Republicans of the Twelfth Indiana District have nominated F. F. Keator for Congress.

SPRINGFIELD, ILL., August 15.—The Prohibitionists of this Congressional District, have nominated Geo. P. Harrington for Congress.

BALTIMORE, MD., August 15.—The Democratic Convention of the Second District reassembled at 11 o'clock to-day, and nine more ballots—making 1,408—were taken.

KALAMAZOO, MICH., August 15.—The Republicans of the Fourth District to-day nominated J. C. Burrows, of Three Rivers, for Congress.

BUSINESS FAILURES.

Mercantile Agency Reports for the Past Week. (By Telegraph to the Morning Star.)

New York, August 15.—The business failures throughout the entire country for the past seven days, as reported by R. G. Dun & Co., number for the United States 263, and for Canada 17.

FOREIGN.

Cholera Ravages.—The Bombardment of Kelung—Foreigners in China Endangered—Irish Affairs—Manchester Markets.

PARIS, August 15.—Rumors are flying about the lobbies of the Senate and Chamber of Deputies to the effect that the French flag ship suffered severely during the bombardment of Kelung.

LONDON, August 15.—All Foo-chow dispatch says that Admiral Dowell, of the British squadron, has arrived at that port. He will arrange with other foreign naval officers here for the protection of Europeans in China.

MANCHESTER, August 15.—The Guardian's commercial article says: The market is firmer, but there has been no advance in prices. There is rather more inquiry for goods and yarns, and sellers are not so easy.

DUBLIN, Aug. 15.—Irish executive authority are busily engaged in investigating anew the Monroa case, in order to determine, if possible, the truth or falsity of the informer Casey's accusation.

LONDON, Aug. 15.—The Times' Food Office dispatch says: Chinese confidence in their ability to resist the French is very dangerous to foreign residents.

LONDON, Aug. 15.—The Daily News expresses the belief that the government will not use any of the public funds for the purpose of repatriating England at the New Orleans Centennial Cotton Exposition.

PARIS, Aug. 15.—The record of ravages of cholera in various French towns during the twenty-four hours, as follows: At Toulouse 3 deaths, at Gersonone 6 deaths and 16 fresh cases, at Nimmes 1 death, at Certe, 7, and at Vaugro 3.

NEW YORK.

Bricklayers Jubilant at their Victory Over the Bosses.—Reorganization of the Erie Railroad Co. (By Telegraph to the Morning Star.)

New York, August 15.—The bricklayers claim this morning that they have virtually won the fight for the nine hour rule. Contractors Peter and Scheffer, who conceded to the Union's demands, yesterday employed four hundred men, and another large contractor is expected to surrender to-day and take one hundred more.

It is stated that the Presidency of the Erie Railroad has been tendered to John King, of the Baltimore & Ohio Co., who will accept it under certain conditions.

COLORADO.

Unsuccessful Effort to Stamp out the Cattle Disease. (By Telegraph to the Morning Star.)

DENVER, August 15.—Cattle men are meeting in the city for the purpose of stamping out the fever, as the disease still exists in different parts of the State.

A Case of Yellow Fever Reported at Key West. (By Telegraph to the Morning Star.)

KEY WEST, August 15.—A case of yellow fever has been reported from the U. S. steamer Galena, said to be the hospital.

Striking coal miners near Wilkesbarre, Pa., will return to work Monday, the operators having unconditionally surrendered to their demands.

An incendiary fire at Lampasas, Texas, destroyed the business portion of the town. The loss has not been estimated.
