Mayor's Court. Henry Burnett, who is possessed of quite a number of porkers, was arraigned yesterday morning for violating the city ordinance in two different instances: first, in allowing one or more of his hogs to run at large on the streets; and second, in resisting an officer who was attempting to arrest one of said hogs and take it to the city pound. The defendant claimed that he was a free fight between himself and the hog catchers, and that the "longest pole could take the peckstone." In other words, he seemed to think that he had a right to keep the hog out of the pound if possible, no matter if it was in the possession of the hog catcher. Mayor Hall alluded to the reluctance he felt in imposing a fine under the circumstances, but at the same time reminded the defendant of the frequency of his violation of the ordinance in question, and finally let him off with a suspended judgment for \$10 having over him; said judgment to be enforced the next time any of his porkers are found running at large on the streets.

A white seamstress named Frank Abraham and a colored woman named Louisa Waddell were charged with acting disorderly on the street Friday night, about 12 o'clock, and the examination resulted in a fine of \$5 being imposed on the woman and \$3 on her festive companion.

He leaves a wife and one child, who were absent from the city when he died. He was about 80 years of age, and was a native of Carteret county.
