

Logan is speaking in Michigan. He has had a sort of reception at the depots along his route making short talks.

- Representative Theodore Lymans, Republican, of Massachusetts, is out in a card. He will not support Blaine. - Gov. St. John, the Prohibition candidate for President, will make four speeches in Indiana next month, at Indian-

apolis, Fort Wayne, Sullivan and Marion. - Albany, Sept. 12.—It is not Gov. Cleveland's intention, as announced in some of the Western papers, to make a trip to Chicago next month and to speak at several points on the way. He has now no expectation of going outside of the State before the election.

- ALBANY, September 11.-A large Democratic ratification meeting was held to night over which Judge Amasa J. Parker presided. The principal speech was made by ex Senator Francis Kernan, who discussed at length the public records of Mr. Blaine and Gov. Cleveland.

CHICAGO, Sept. 12 .- Several hun dred German citizens of Chicago, who describe themselves as "Republicans who will this time vote for Cleveland," have signed their names to an address directed to Mr. Carl Schurz, requesting him to make a speech to them in their native tongue, in which he is to give them his reasons for opposing Blaine and espousing the Cleveland cause.

- The Boston Herald claims to have it on good authority that Mr. Blaine's doned West Virginia as hopeless more than a weak ago, and has been putting all the money and work into Ohio that could be spared from Maine. With the surrender of this forlorn hope, it says, vanishes all chance of carrying a Southern State for Blaine.—New York Times

— WASHINGTON, September 13.— Some of the many citizens of Ohio who hold positions under the Government in this city, instead of handing over their campaign contributions to the Squeezing Committee, are taking precautions to send their money direct to the party leaders in Ohio. They realize that the death struggle of the Blaine party is to be fought in that State.—New York Times.

- ALBANY, September 13.-Two more notable accessions to the Cleveland side from the Republican ranks are announced to day. Major General Abner Doubleday, United State Army, called on the Governor this afternoon and expressed his intention of voting for him. The Hon. Henry L. Lamb, formerly Superintendent of the Bank Department, has also declared for the Democratic nominee. Neither of them regard Mr. Blaine as a fit man for President.-New York Times.

- The announcement that Mr. Blaine and Gen. Logan will speak in Cincinnati, and that Postmaster General Gres-ham will at once take the stump in Ohio is considered evidence that the "exigencies of the campaign" require the presence of the Republican candidates in Ohio, and that, as in Maine, money and hurrah will be used without stint to keep the State in the Republican column. The Democrats will have all the big men in the party speaking in the State and will probably be well supplied with money.—N. Y. Times,

COTTON.

N. Y. Commercial and Financial Chronicle. NEW YORK, Sept. 13 .- The movement of the crop, as indicated by our telegrams from the South to-night, is given below. For the week ending this evening (Sept. 13) the total receipts have reached 42,624 bales, against 16,237 bales last week, 4,-914 bales the previous week and 2,865 bales three weeks since; making the total receipts since the 1st of September, 1884, 57,725 bales, against 97,656 bales for the same period of 1883, showing a decrease since Sept.

1, 1884, of 39,931 bales. The exports for the week ending this evening reach a total of 16,802 bales, of which 16,223 were to Great Britain, 208 to France and 371 to

the rest of the Continent, while the stocks as made up this even-ing are now 119,960 bales.

To-day there were slight fluctua-tions and limited dealings, without important changes from yesterday, but as compared with last Friday the close was at a decline of 10@20 points, the latter for September. Cotton on the spot remained quotably unchanged until yesterday, when there was a decline of 2 to, leading to more business for home consumption. To day there was again a fair business for home consumption, the demand being chiefly for the better grades, and quotations were steady on the basis of 10%e for middling uplands. (The closing figures in our last were for middling Orleans.) The total sales for forward delivery for the week were 259,100 bales.

Quarantine Notice.

QUARANTINE FOR THE PORT OF WILMING-TON will be enforced from May 1st to November

Pilots will bring all vessels from Ports couth of Cape Fear to the Quarantine anchorage; also, all vessels which have had any kind of sickness on board during the passage, or on arrival, and will cause a signal to be set in the main rigging on the port side, as soon as possible after crossing the

No vessel must leave the Quarantine anchor age, or allow any person, steamer or tug boat, lighter, or boat of any kind to go along side, unless by written authority from the Quarantine Physician, and every vessel must be anchored as far to the eastward of the channel as is consist-

far to the eastward of the channel as is consistent with safety.

Regulations governing vessels while in Quarantine may be had on application at the office of the Quarantine Physician at Smithville.

Applications for permits to visit vessels in Quarantine must be made to Dr. Thomas F. Wood or Dr. Geo. G. Thomas, and permits so obtained will be endorsed by the Quarantine Physician, if, in his opinion, it is proper and safe to allow communication with such vessels.

A penalty of \$200, for each and every offence, will be enforced against any persons violating any of the Quarantine Regulations of the Port.


