FOREIGN.

The King of Belgium and the Educational Bill-Affairs in Egypt-The Three Emperors at Skierniwice-China-German Colonization Schemes -The Cholera, &c.

(By Cable to the Morning Star.) SUAKIM, Sept. 17.—The success day before yesterday of friendly Arabs and police
escorting a convoy of provisions and
women to Suakim, in defeating an attacking party of Haddendowas has had an inspiring effect on friendly tribes. Two
thousand of the Amaras tribe attacked the
Haddendowas and after an engagement of
four hours succeeded in dislodging them;
billing seventy and capturing many arms killing seventy and capturing many arms and camels. The loss of the Amaras was thirty killed and wounded.

BRUSSELS, Sept. 17.—The agitation in regard to the new Education bill, which the gard to the new Education bill, which the King has already signed, still continues. To-day the Mayors of Brussels, Ghent, Lieg, Moro, Arton and Antwerp, were granted an audience by the King. The Mayor of Brussels acting as spokesman for all, uttered a strong protest against the bill. The deputation for which he spoke, he said, represented 820 communes with a population of 2,800,000. The King, in reply, said he had received numerous petitions, also, in favor of the bill. It was his duty to comply with the national will, which to comply with the national will, which was expressed by the majority in Parliament. He wanted always to scrupulously observe the duties of a constitutional monarch and so remain faithful to his oath. He should continue in the future as in the past to spare no efforts necessary to assure the regular working of the parliamentary regime. He would treat all Belgians alike in exercising his prerogatives. He served the Belgiums; not one political party, but both, and with Belgium the nobic cause of liberty to which he was deeply and stead-fastly devoted. Dense crowds collected about the palace during the audience of the Mayors and loudly cheered those gentlemen as they came out.

The Democratic Nomination in the Second Congressional District.

WASHINGTON.

Speculations as to the Secretaryship of the Treasury-The Law in Relation to Tonnage Taxes. (By Telegraph to the Morning Star.)

Washington, Sept. 17.—Information was received here to-day that Hon. L. P. Morton, Minister to France, who had intended to have sailed for New York Tuesday of this week, has concluded to defer his departure for two weeks. This fact would seem to effectually dispose of the report that he was coming home to assume the duties of Secretary of the Treasury, as that office will have to be filled within the ensuing seven days. It is said by Mr. Morton's friends that he obtained leave of absence to come to this country before the ton's friends that he obtained leave of absence to come to this country before the death of Secretary Folger, and his original intention to have started a few days after that event was merely an accident and had no possible connection with the vacancy in the Cabinet. Mr. Morton's object in coming home just at this time is said to be to attend to some private business in New York. It was stated positively to-day that Gen. Sharpe would not accept the Treasury portfolio. The prevailing impression in this city now in regard to the vacant office, is that unless Assistant Secretary Coon is promoted the office will be given to some prominent citizen of New York, a personal friend of the President, whose name has not yet been mentioned in connection with the office.

The Deputy Commissioner of Navigation

The Deputy Commissioner of Navigation has decided that vessels fraudulently dunnaged, for the purpose of reducing their tonnage, must be admeasured without regard to dunnage and to pay tonnage fees accordingly. It has been the practice in some cases to reduce the tonnage of holds. some cases to reduce the tonnage of holds by nailing on a false flooring and ceiling, the object being to avoid the payment of legal tonnage dues, or to reduce the tonnage so as to avoid certain requirements, local or otherwise; or else to obtain certain privi-leges accorded to vessels of small tonnage. Thus, vessels under five tons are exempt from license and under ten tons exempt from certain restrictions in the oyster busi-ness. The law requires the actual tonnage to be ascertained.

MEXICO.

Release of Gen. Filacio from Imprisonment.

[Special Telegram to the Star.] CITY OF MEXICO, VIA GALVESTON, September 17.— Gen. Vicente Riva Filacio, who had been in prison since December last, was released to-day. The reason given for his imprisonment was his failure to report at the palace at the time of the riot in connection with the issue of nickel coin by the Government. He was at that time a member of Cougress and had made a speech against the measure providing for the issuing of nickel money. There is general rejoicing over his release.

LOUISIANA.


