

CRIMES AND CASUALTIES.

Highway Robbery and Murder at Chattanooga—Losses by Fire at Pittsburgh—Nineteen Persons Killed by the Fall of a Stand at the Erie County Fair, Pa.—A Mile and a Half of Railroad Trestle Burned near New Orleans.

St. Louis, September 26.—A special from Chattanooga, Tenn., says: Samuel Hayes, cashier of the Greenwood Coal Co., was found dead on the railroad track this morning. His clothes had been rifled and his watch was missing. He was murdered for the purpose of robbery. Two bullet holes were found in his head.

Pittsburg, Pa., September 26.—The total loss by the Southside fire, last night, was \$200,000. The insurance aggregates \$118,000.

Chicago, September 26.—A dispatch from Erie, Pa., says: The grand stand on the race course at the county fair collapsed at 3.15 o'clock this afternoon. Nearly a thousand people were in attendance. But one section of the stand was wrecked. Two hundred people were thrown into a mass. Nineteen dead bodies have already been taken from the wreck. Police and firemen have been sent to the rescue.

New Orleans, September 26.—A mile and a half of trestle across Lake Pontchartrain, on the Northeastern Railroad, was burned, between the two draws near the mouth of Right's pass.

FOREIGN.

Cholera Ravages Prussia and the Vatican—Egypt and the Powers—England's Action Criticized by the French Press—Manchester Markets.

Madrid, Sept. 26.—There was one death from cholera to-day in the city of Barcelona. In the province of Alicante during the past 24 hours eight fresh cases of cholera developed, and there were seven deaths.

Rome, Sept. 26.—Herr von Schlaezer, Prussian Minister to the Vatican, has arrived in Rome. He will present to Cardinal Jacobini, papal secretary of state, tomorrow a note indicating the basis on which Prussia proposes to resume negotiations with the Vatican.

Rome, Sept. 26.—Reports of the ravages of cholera throughout Italy for the past twenty-four hours give a total of 432 fresh cases and 213 deaths. At Naples there were 201 fresh cases and 95 deaths, as against 242 cases and 105 deaths for the preceding twenty-four hours. At Genoa there were 51 fresh cases and 20 deaths.

Cairo, Sept. 26.—It is expected that the Egyptian government will simply make a formal acknowledgment of the receipt of the protest against the suspension of the sinking fund, which was presented yesterday by representatives of Germany, Austria, France and Russia.

Paris, Sept. 26.—Le Paris urges the Powers to inform England that she has gone too far in prompting the Egyptian government to take the law in regard to the financial measures which she had expected to enforce in Egypt.

Manchester, Sept. 26.—Cloth is dull and prices greatly in buyers' favor. Yarn quiet and rather easier. The Guardian's commercial article says: "The market was quiet throughout the week, except during yesterday, when there was more business inspired by a decline in prices of j.d. to 1d. There has been more inquiry for export yarns."

ARCHBISHOP RYAN.

A Special Receipt from the Pope of Rome.

Philadelphia, Pa., September 26.—A private dispatch from Rome, received in this city to-day, states that owing to the prevalence of cholera in Italy the Papal Consistory will not convene until December. In consequence of this Archbishop Ryan cannot receive the pallium at that time. In order, however, that his Grace may attend the Plenary Council, to be held in Baltimore, in November, in possession of the full power of his rank, the Pope has granted to Archbishop Ryan a special receipt, giving him the authority of the pallium confers. A cablegram to that effect has just been received by the Archbishop.

CANADA.

Meeting of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen at Toronto.

Toronto, Ont., September 26.—The ball last night of the locomotive firemen was a great success; over 700 guests being present, including the Governor General and Mayor. At to-day's session it was decided to change the name of the organization to the "Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen of North America," thereby covering the United States, Canada and Mexico.

MARYLAND.

Police Commissioners Close all the Pool Rooms in Baltimore.

Baltimore, September 26.—All the pool rooms in the city were closed to-day by order of the Board of Police Commissioners. They will not be reopened unless the appeal of James, the gambler, (convicted yesterday) for a new trial shall be decided favorably.

NEW YORK.

Governor Cleveland's Proposed Visit to Buffalo.

Albany, Sept. 26.—Gov. Cleveland has not definitely decided on what day he will leave the capital for Buffalo, but it will probably be Wednesday or Thursday of next week. There will be no demonstration along the line, if the Governor's wishes are complied.

OHIO.

The Cincinnati Stone Moulders' Strike Ended.

Cincinnati, Sept. 26.—The Stone Moulders' Union held a meeting here last night, which resulted in an agreement to return to work immediately. The strike has been in existence for nearly a year.

LOUISIANA. A Modification of Quarantine Restrictions at New Orleans.

New Orleans, Sept. 26.—A special to the Picayune, from Baton Rouge, says: "The Governor to-day issued a proclamation in accordance with resolutions adopted by the State Board of Health amending the proclamation of quarantine issued April 17th, and changing the limit of quarantine detention from ten to five days, to take effect October 1st. Also, directing and requiring that all quarantine restrictions or detentions of vessels arriving at any port of Louisiana be wholly removed on and after October 31st; provided, that nothing herein be construed to change or modify the instructions heretofore made by the Board against vessels arriving from ports infected with cholera."

BUSINESS FAILURES.

Mercantile Agency Reports for the Past Week.

New York, Sept. 26.—The business failures throughout the entire country for the past seven days, as reported by R. C. Dun & Co., number for the United States 187, and for Canada 26. A total of 213, as against a total of 218 last week, showing a slight decrease for the week. Failures are still numerous in the Pacific States. In Canada and in New York city and in other sections of the country failures are rather below an average.

WASHINGTON.

Secretary Coon's Call for Bonds.

Washington, September 26.—Acting Secretary of the Treasury Coon to-day issued the 131st call for redemption of bonds. The call is for ten millions of three per cents. and it matures Nov. 1st.
