FOREIGN.

France and the Egyptian Question-Admiral Courbet Ready to Resume Operations Against the Chinese-The French Chambers to be Summoned - Garribaldians Succoring Cholera Patients in Italy-The Copyright Congress at Berne.

(By Cable to the Morning Star.) ROME, Sept. 27.—Cardinal San Felice has arrived at Resina. Upon seeing a number of Garibaldians who wore the historical red shirts, succoring cholera patients, he approached them and shook hands with them warmly. He was much moved and expressed his admiration of their action. People who witnessed the scene loudly

cheered the Cardinal and the Garibaldians. PARIS, September 27.—A meeting of the French Cabinet was held to-day. Prime Minister Ferry submitted the identical note presented to Nubar Pasha, Egyptian Prime Minister, by the representatives of the Russian, German, Austrian and French governments, protesting against the suspen

sion of the sinking fund. M. Ferry informed his colleagues that Admiral Courbet had telegraphed that French preparations for the resumption of warlike operations against the Chinese were completed. The Cabinet resolved to summon the Chambers to meet October 14th. The government has resolved to retrench its expenditures during the year 1885. The estimates will be cut down to the extent of 50,000,000 francs.

BERNE, September 27 .- The Copyright Congress has resolved that authors belonging to the Union shall enjoy equal rights with the natives of all contracting countries, subject to the laws of the country where the work originated, or in case of unpublished manuscript, to the laws of the author's country. These rules are to apply to authors publishing their works in the country belonging to the Union, of which they are not natives. Authors are to enjoy ten years' exclusive right to translation in all countries belonging to the Union. The publication of extracts, or entire pieces of scientific works, or works of instruction, will be permitted, provided the author's name is given. A permanent international protection bureau has been established at Berne.

WASHINGTON.

The New Government Dispatch Boats -Postal Regulations. (By Telegraph to the Morning Star.)

WASHINGTON, Sept. 27.—The new dis-patch boat, the Dolphin, is reported to be ready to start for New York at any time, The Atlants will be far enough advanced to be towed to New York for engines and boilers within the next six weeks, and the Boston will be ready about the same time to receive engines and boilers at Chester. Mr. M. Coryell, civilian member of the Naval Advisory Board, has resigned, his resignation to take effect October 1st. He

Acting Postmaster General Hatton has sued an order that on and after October 1st, 1884, all postoffices of the first class and their stations or branch offices, shall be kept open to the public for the issue and payment of money orders and for the registration and the delivery of registered matter, until 6 o'clock p. m. every day, ex-cept Sundays and legal holidays.

The Rockingham House, Portmouth, N.H., the finest hotel in New England, was burned yesterday. Loss from \$90,000 to \$140,000.

The weekly statement of the Asso-ciated Banks shows the following changes: Loans increase \$130,700; specie decrease 708,800; legal tenders increase \$352,800; leposits decrease \$588,100; circulation increase \$1,900; reserve decrease \$208,975. The banks now hold \$26,945,725 in excess of legal requirements.

This evening begins for our Jewish fellow-citizens the holiest of all the holy days of this year-the "Day of Atonement" or "Sabbath of Sabbaths," as the Bible calls it. It is founded on Leviticus 23, 27: "In the seventh month, on the tenth day of the month, is the Day of Atonement, a holy convocation shall it be unto you, and ye shall afflict yourselves," &c. During the whole of its continuance, i. e. from 6 o'clock this evening till the same hour to-morrow evening, the adherent of the Mosaic faith abstains from all carnal engagements, as eating, drinking, and performs no manner of physical work. As the idea underlying this peculiar fast is that of Divine mercy extending to the greatest sinner and forgiving the repentant, the Israelite spends this day in fasting and praying; but as he is taught to believe that only sins against God are mercifully forgiven on this day, while sins committed against a fellow-man are not atoned for by fasting, he endeavors to be doubly diligent during the interval between the New Year and the Day of Atonement (usually styled penitential days) in deeds of mercy and charity and reconciling those whom he may have offended; and having made his peace with man, he approaches the mercy seat with the earnest purpose of making his peace with his God. In the Temple, corner of Fourth and Market streets, Rabbi Mendelsohn will conduct the services both this evening, beginning at 6 o'clock, and the whole day tomorrow, beginning at 11 o'clock. He will also preach this evening, and to-morrow at about noon and 4 o'clock in the afternoon. Visitors are welcome.





A Brig Capsized in the North Sea-Two Schooners Damaged by Collision in Chesapeake Bay. [By Telegraph to the Morning Star.]

LONDON, September 27 .- A brig, supposed to be the Ornen, Capt. Borch, from Savannah, August Sth, for Hamburg, has capsized off the Island of Norderney, in the North Sea. A life-buoy marked Ornen and a number of casks marked Savannah, have been picked up near the spot where the vessel capsized.

PHILADELPHIA, PA., September 27.-The schooner Henrietta Hill, from New Berne, N. C., reports: At 3.30 a. m., on the 23rd inst., when four miles above Smith's Point light, off the Potomac river, Chesapeake Bay, collided with the schooner Albert Mason, from Baltimore, for Jersey City. The Hill stove her starboard bow, carried away stanchions and cathead split her bowsprit, and carried away all her head gear. The captain of the Mason was knocked overboard by the collision, but was rescued by the Hill and transferred to an oyster boat, which went in search of the Mason. The damage, if any, to the latter vessel is unknown.


