### FOREIGN.

Affairs in Egypt-Expense of the Gordon Relief Exposition-The Fate of Col. Stewart-Drowning Accident on the River Drave - Opening of the Danish Rigsdag-Matters in France -British Cabinet Council - French Operations in China.

(By Cable to the Morning Star.) COPENHAGEN, October 6.—The King opened the Rigsdag in the hall of the University to day. In his speech to members he urged that the independence of the country be secured by passing measures for its defence.

London, October 6.—The expenses of the Gordon relief expedition are increasing. The Paymaster General at Cairo has notified the government that he requires £150,-000 weekly. Mr. Gladstone has issued a circular noti-

fying his supporters to attend the opening of Parliament, as he proposes at the earliest moment to submit important and pressing business for the consideration of that body. The War Office is uncertain as to the fate of Col. Stewart, who with forty men, was en route to Dongola. Their steamer struck the rocks and they were unable to float her. A bargain was made with the Arabs to provide camels and conduct the party through the desert to Merain. The Arabs proved treacherous, however, and massacred the first party which landed from the steamer. They then boarded the vessel and killed those who remained, with the exception of four men whose names are unknown. It is feared that Col. Stewart was among the killed. It is unknown whether Mr. Powers, correspondent of the Times, had returned to Khartoum or was with Col. Stewart.

#### COTTON.

The Weather Unfavorable to the Growing Crop in the Memphis Dis-

(By Telegraph to the Morning Star.) MEMPHIS, October 6.—The cotton report for the Memphis district, embracing West Tennessee, North Mississippi, North Ar-kansas and North Alabama, to be issued

to-morrow, by Messrs. Fontaine & Co., "The weather during the month of September has been unfavorable to the growing cotton crop. Hot, dry weather, which was a continuance of the drought extend-

ing back through August, prevailed throughout the district until September 20th, when occasional rain fell, principally in Arkansas and Tennessee. The drought had materially affected the plant, and the rains which subsequently fell in many lo-calities added to the damage already sustained. The favorable prospects indicated in the July report, which at the time promised an increased yield, have, in this district, been changed. Cotton in the main has not fruited well; neither has the plant retained its bolls. From all over the district serious damage is reported from drought, rust and excessive rains. These have caused a general revision of the prospective yield, which, as now indicated, will be 17½ per cent. less than last year. The weather since these reports were furnished, has been more seasonable, and a continuance of the favorable conditions together with late frost, would improve a large proportion of the growing crop, especially in the bottoms, which would reduce the percentage of decrease and possibly make the yield in this district approximate to that of

Corn has not suffered to the extent of cotton and there will be ample raised to more than supply the demands this season of the country.

## WEST VIRGINIA.

Gen. Logan's Electioneering Tour-Blaine's Speech at Moundaville. (By Telegraph to the Morning Star.)

CHARLESTON, Oct. 6 .- Gen. John A Logan arrived here from Huntingdon at 12 o'clock, on his way through the Southern part of the State. A large crowd greeted him along the route. Gen. Logan stopped off here and made a speech to a large audience. He left two hours later. He will stop at all towns up the valley and through to the Virginia line. There was much enthusiasm manifested and firing of

FARMOUNT, Oct. 6.—Mr. Blaine's party left Wheeling at 8 o'clock this morning by a special train on the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad for Grafton. The first stop was made at Moundsville, where Mr. Blaine was warmly received. He said: "I am glad to be in West Virginia. I consider it one of the encouraging signs of the times that an earnest contest is going on in what was once a slave State for the ascendancy of Republican principles; and Republican principles this year means a tariff, for the protection of American labor. [Cheers]. If West Virginia is in favor of that, she If West Virginia is in favor of that, she is Republican. If she is opposed to it, she is not. Your rich beds of coal and iron, and your vast forests favor the great development of manufacturing industries. They can be developed under a protective tariff; they cannot be without it."

At Cameron, Littleton, Mannington and Farmington there were brief stops, and at each point Mr. Blaine spoke of the importance to West Virginia of a protective tariff. At Fairmount, there was quite a large meeting. Mr. Blaine left the train and addressed the people from a stand.

Through Business. (By Telegraph to the Morning Star.) PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 6.—Information was received this afternoon to the effect that the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad Company had been given notice by the Pennsylvania Railroad Company that it would on and after October 12th, (Sunday next), be deprived of the privilege of running its trains over the Pennsylvania Co.'s lines, between Baltimore and New York. The news of this important action was verified at the Pennsylvania Railroad main office, and it was further stated that neither pasand it was further stated that neither passenger tickets nor baggage checked through from the West by way of the Baltimore & Ohio lines would be received by the Pennsylvania Railroad Company. In explanation of this action, officers of the Pennsylvania Company state that the movement is part of a general system of removement is part of a general system of reducing expenses. "We are now hauling,"he

continued, "two trains each way daily for the Baltimore & Ohio Company, and the latter does not give us business enough to warrant a continuance of the connection. We pay car service for cars, and think that recent experiences have shown that we are able to handle ourselves all traffic between Baltimore and New York. I am sure that this is true of through business. This step need not incommode travelling in the least. Through passengers coming from the West destined for New York and Philadelphia, by way of the Baltimore & Ohio, have to change cars in Baltimore. Yes: the have to change cars in Baltimore. Yes; the Baltimore & Ohio will be left without any available New York connection."

TOBACCO.

Fair Prospect for Planters and Dealers in the Weed.

[By Telegraph to the Morning Star.] DANVILLE, VA., October 6 .- At a meeting of the Tobacco Association this evening, Capt. Thomas J. Talbott was elected President. Capt. Herndon, the retiring President, gave the figures of the trade recently sent out by the Associated Press, and added a statement that the acreage of last season in Virginia and North Carolina was greater than the average acreage by about 20 per cent., and the yield about 90 per cent. of an average yield, and that the stock of old tobacco in the markets was unusually short. The conclusion was that there was a fair prospect for business next year for the planter and dealer.
