#### FROM ALL PARTS OF THE WORLD

FOREIGN.

Mining Disaster in Moravia-Advices from Egypt-The Nile Expedition-Orange Riots in Newfoundland-The Cyclone in Sicily-The Cholera in Spain and Italy-Chinese Troops Slaughtered by the French in Ton-

quin. (By Cable to the Morning Star.) ROME, October 9.-Later reports from Catina state that 400 persons were injured by the cyclone, and that the damage will amount to 4,000,000 lire.

ODESSA, October 9.-A man named Dautche has been sentenced to thirteen years' penal servitude in Siberia for throwing sulphuric acid over M. Garonovich, a

VIENNA, October 9.-An explosion of firedamp has occurred in the mines at Ostran, in Moravia, causing the death of twenty persons.

ALEXANDRIA, October 9.—The Phare D Alexandric (newspaper) has been suspended by the authorities for three months for advocating the restoration to power of the ex-Khedive Ismail Pasha.

CAIRO, October 9 .- Advices from Dongola state that the Mudir of that place has received confirmation of the report that a steamer from Khartoum was wrecked after leaving Abu Hamed. All on board the vessel landed to try to hire camels. They gave the natives presents and the natives invited them to their dwellings, where they massacred them. It is unknown whether there were any Europeans among the vic-WADY HALFA, October 9.-Gen. Wolse-

ley reviwed the troops who are to take part in the Nile expedition to day. The mounted infantry managed their camels perfectly. The first batch of row boats of the expedition passed the cataract easily against the strong current. The heavy division of the camel corps will encamp at the Pyramids until ordered to advance.

BRUSSELS, October 9.—A duel was fought to day between M. Tardien, editor of the Independence Belge, and M. Valdero, editor of the National Belge. Neither of them was wounded.

I IST. John's, N. F., October 9.-Orange disturbances are again developing at Harbor Grace. The gates of the convent were torn down and flung into the sea and one Riverhead man was beaten almost to death A dispatch from Hopedale, Labrador, an-

nounces the loss on the 7th inst. of a fishing vessel and all hands, numbering five.

MADRID, Oct. 9 .- During the past twenty-four hours, there have been two deaths from cholera, in the province of Alicante. The Imperial states that there have been 17 cases of cholera and 14 deaths in Barcelona since September 14th. Barcelona papers deny the truth of this statement.

ROME, Oct. 9.—Reports from the cholera infected districts of Italy for the past twenty four hours, give a total of 145 fresh cases and 77 deaths, against 187 cases and 97 deaths for the preceding twenty-four

Paris, Oct. 9.—A dispatch received from Hanoi to-night states that Gen. Negrier's column had an engagement at the village of Kef with 6,000 Chinese regulars. who occupied entrenchments around the central redoubt. The Chinese commenced the attack at 9 o'clock in the morning by trying to surround the French, and the fighting lasted until 2 o'clock in the afternoon, when the retreat of the Chinese toward the frontier of China was cut off. The Chinese troops then fled in the direction of Daakon, pursued by the French. The Kef garrison defended their position bravely, compelling the French to surround the redoubt and carry it at the point of the bayonet. The Chinese loss in the village alone was 600 killed. The French troops fought with spirit and captured all of the enemy's war material, mules and horses. A French captain and 20 men were killed, and 8 officers and 50 men were wounded. Gen. Negrier was slightly wounded. Gen. Brier D'Lilse has started for Kef to assist Gen. Negrier's forces.

### WASHINGTON.

The October Term of the U. S. Su preme Court.

(By Telegraph to the Morning Star.) Washington, October 9.—The Supreme Court of the United States will meet Monday next for the October term of 1884. Six of the Justices are already in the city, and all are expected to take their seats when the Court reassembles. The number of cases on the docket is 1,025, or 54 less than were docketed up to the corresponding time last year. The Court holds under advisement ten cases which were argued or submitted at the last term, but only one of them has general interest. It is the so-called "Headmoney case," of the Liverpool, New York & Philadelphia Steamship Co., against the Commissioners of Emigration. A number of cases have been specially assigned for the second day of the forthcoming term of the Court, and the indications are that most of them will be argued. The longevity pay case of the United States against Lieut. Charles Morton, was brought up by appeal from the Court of Claims. The argument and decision in this case will have more than usual interest in willitary circles, since the principle involved affects, it is said, the pay of nearly a thousand army officers. The question in controversy is whether the period of military training at West Point Military Academy is to be regarded as service in the error in computing an officer's vice in the army in computing an officer's longevity pay. Chief Justice Drake, in delivering the opinion of the court below in favor of the claimant reviewed the laws and regulations relating to the Military Academy, and said: 'In view of these plain and express provisions, we are at loss to understand why a cadet at the Military Academy is not in service in the army. That he is pursuing these studies and passing through discipline which are to fit him for higher duty and perhaps greater achievements in military life, does not, in our opinion, at all affect or even touch the status given him in unmistakable words by the laws under which both the academy and the army exist. No private soldier in the army is more in service than a Cadet at West Point." If the decision of the Court of Claims is sustained, it will add four years to the period of service of West Point graduates in the computation of their longevity pay.
