



PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 11.—There was quite a scene at the Butler meeting here to night. A large wooden spoon was thrown upon the stage. Considerable con-fusion followed, but Butler picked it up and used it to make gestures with for some minutes. - N. Y. Herald:

- Washington, Oct. 11.—Secretary Lincoln will leave Washington in a few days for Illinois, where he will make a number of speeches in support of the Re-publican candidate for President. He will probably make his first speech at Mattoon. Secretary Teller will enter the campaign in Colorado next week.—N. Y. Herald.

- I left Washington forty-eight hours ago with a deep-seated conviction that the chance of success in Ohio was about three to seven. True, I have not been at the front very long, but long enough to reverse my table. To my mind now the odds are in favor of the Democrats as seven is to three. The truth is Blaine is on the run. - Columbus Special to the Cincinnati Enquirer.

- HIGHLAND MILLS, Orange county. Oct. 11.-At the meeting held here tonight Professor F. G. Tisdall, of New York city, addressed the meeting in favor of Cleveland and Hendricks. The speaker was glad to know that many Republicans were present, as he wished to explain to them why, after voting for Lincoln, Grant, Hayes and Garfield, and even for Folger against Cleveland for Governor, he was now about to vote for the Democratic Presidential candidate. - N. Y. Herald.

- Washington, Oct. 10 .- The withdrawal of their electoral ticket by the Virginia Straighout-out Republicans was pursuant to orders from Blaine and the first step in the arrangement entered into be-tween Mahone and Blaine at their interview in Philadelphia. Perfect union of all the anti-Democratic factions is in progress and by next week, whichever way Ohio goes. measures will be advanced designed to carry Virginia for Blaine. Should Ohio go Democratic, or the result leave the State in doubt in November, the measures and the effort to wrest the State from Cleveland will be all the more energetic.-Phil.

- Columbus, O., Oct. 11.-Judge Thurman addressed a large and enthusias-Gumble Hall on the railroad legislation in Congress with which Blaine was connected. The Judge said that Blaine tried to kill by amendment the bill that he and Senator Edmunds advocated to get \$150,000,000 from the Union Racific Railroad due the government, and that Blaine usually favored the corporations. He also replied to the tariff speeches of Blaine along his route, and advocated a reduction of taxes as the true relief to tradesmen as well as workingmen. Indeed, there never was more confidence of success at the Democratic State Headquarters on the eve of an election than there is to day .- N. Y. Her-

ald, Oct. 12. COLUMBUS, O., Oct. 11.—Each day brings forth new interest in the approaching election and adds to the confidence which the Democrats have expressed for several days, that they are now sure to win at the State election on Tuesday. The general idea prevails among those who are best informed, and especially so among the Democratic leaders who have been all over the State the most, that the National elec-tion will be definitely settled in this State on Tuesday if a first-class victory will bring about that result. This is based on reliable polls of the State which are being perfected and revised from certain quarters every day, and the tide of general good feeling which has set in more recently adds to the confidence. The anxiety on the part of the Republican leaders and the fact that they are unable any longer to inspire enthusiasm with the Blaine hippodrome fills them with still greater fears.-N. Y. Her-

- COMUMBUS, Oct. 10,-The conference of Republican leaders with Blaine last night continued until 1 o'clock this morning. It was not altogether satisfactory. That which was called a poll of the State submitted to the Presidential candidate turned out after close questioning on Blaine's part to be in many cases mere reports from county chairmen in the rough. These reports had been received from eighty-four out of the eighty-eight counties in the State, not including Hamilton and Cuyahoga, which embrace Cincinnati and Cleveland. In about one-third of the counties there had been a careful poll. This was chiefly through the Republican counties of Eastern Ohio. The apparent want of definite Republican information from that dangerous part of the State annoyed Mr. Blaine very much, and he plainly said it was a poor condition to be in in a time in the canvass too late to apply a remedy.—
Phil. Times, Oct. 11.

- Columbus, Ohio, Oct. 11.-Speaking to day with Chairman Bargar, of the Democratic State Committee, I suggested that if the poll of the State which his committee had made was as perfect as it was reported to be, he had it in his power to relieve the suffering public of the United States of a great deal of anxiety. "That," said he, "is a popular fallacy. Now we have secured, I think, as good a poll as it was possible to make, and for some purposes it is very valuable. As to the number of votes which were in the State a few weeks ago, for instance, it is quite accurate, save as to two or three of the large cities. In these cities it is simply an impossibility to get a correct poll which will indicate the political preferences of the voters. The population shifts, the men are hard to find." "And what do you estimate Tuesday's vote at, Mr. Bargar?" "I think it will be over 780,000. As to the majorities, however, any man who pretends to be able to give you within 5,000 of a majority either does not know what he is talking about or is trying to deceive you."—N. Y. World.

— Columbus, Oнio, October 11.— Mr. Blame has made the canvass of the State. If the vote of the Republicans is got out it will be owing more to his person-al drumming of the State than to the work of the county and town organizations. Some of his friends think that he made a mistake in returning for a second tour. Mr. Frye has expressed this opinion. The second visit has not been so successful as the first in drawing crowds, and the crowds have contained more bold and hostile men than those he met earlier in the campaign.
