WASHINGTON, Oct. 22.—At the sale of Government property at Harper's Ferry to-day, the Potomac water power sold for \$25,100 and the Shenandoah water power for \$810.

At a meeting of the International Meridian Conference to-day a declaration was admitted embracing all resolutions previously agreed upon by the Conference.

CINCINNATI, Oct. 22.—A verdict was rendered for the plaintiff yesterday in the suit of the Third National Bank of Urbana, Ohio, against the Cincinnati Southern Railway Company, to recover a sum of money which the bank had loaned to the former secretary of the railroad company, Geo. Doughty, who is now dead, for which he deposited as collateral certificates of stock of the Cincinnati Southern Railway Company, which, since his death, have been shown to be an over-issue of stock, without the approval and consent of the directors of the road, made clandestinely by Mr. Doughty.
