- There are nearly three thousand names on the roll of the Independent Republicans of Kings county, and new members are being constantly added to it. It is estimated that the independent vote will exceed 10,000 in Brooklyn. The event of the week will be the meeting at the Rink, which is to be addressed by Mr. George William Curtis and Colonel T. W. Higginson, on Thursday evening.-N. Y. Herald Oct. 28th.

- R. & L. Lassar Steinhardt, father and son, are manufacturers of ribbons and silk goods, and Republicans of the most radical kind. They employ a large force of girls and forty or more men, of whom about thirty are voters, at their factory at No. 550 West Fiftieth street, near Eleventh avenue. It has been reported that the Messrs. Steinbardt have issued an order that no one in their employ should vote for Cleveland and Hendricks on penscharge from their works.—N. I

- Washington, Oct. 27.-Ex-Senator Chaffee of Colorado, and R. C. Kerns, of St. Louis, arrived here this morning, and after breakfasting together, left for North Carolina. It is reported that they took a pretty large sum of money with them to be used in that State on election day. There seems to be no doubt that a tremendous effort is to be made to carry North Carolina, and probably Virginia, by Republicans who seem to be realizing the hopelessness of the fight in New York.

- MONTGOMERY, ALA., Oct. 27.-There is some feeling here in consequence of the United States authorities who appoint Federal supervisors of election refusing to appoint men recommended by Democratic county committees. In some instances Republicans and men not in accord with Democrats, but classing themselves as Independents, have been appointed in clear violation of the law. It is reported on good authority that large quantities of firearms have passed through this city .- Special to the World.

- CHICAGO, Oct. 27.—The Democratic Central Committee has completed a canvass of the State, and while, for prudential reasons, it declines to make known the result in detail, the fact is given out that it indicates a small majority for Cleveland, giving him Illinois's electoral vote, and that Harrison will be elected Governor by from 12,000 to 15,000 majority. The Independent Republicans, who have done a large amount of work, also claim the State for Cleveland, even more strongly than do the Democrats.—Special to the World.

-New York, Oct. 27. - The political figure men here at headquarters are mostly guessers. The difficulty is that they have a way on both sides of guessing far out beyond their depth. At the Republi-can headquarters I found they were guessing that New York, New Jersey and Connecticut would go for Blaine, while there was something more than a guess about Indiana. At the Democratic rooms they were guessing that Indiana and Connecticut would go for Cleveland, with much more confidence about New York and New Jersey than guessing implies. The best of the feeling, however, is with the Democrats. Their reports are good from all sections of the three important States grouped here. But they are not relying upon these reports altogether, and there is an anxiety about the kind of work which the Republicans may do in the last few days of the campaign.—Special to Phil. Times.
