GOVERNOR CLEVELAND!!

His Visit to New Haven—Immense Crowds Gather to Greet Him at Towns Along the Route—An Oval at All Along the Line.

ALBANY, N. Y., Oct. 30.—Gov. Cleveland, accompanied by Private Secretary Lamont and Adjutant General Farnsworth, drove from the Executive Mansion in a closed carriage shortly before 10 o'clock this morning to the Boston & Albany Railroad station, where they took the regular train for Pittsford. There was no demonstration of any sort, in accordance with Gov. Cleveland's expressed desire.

PITTSFORD, MASS., October 30.—It having been learned this morning that Gov. Cleveland would pass through Pittsford en route from Albany via the Housatonic Railroad to New Haven—though by many reports was considered to be unfounded—more than 1,000 persons were at the depot to meet him. The Governor's stay here of half an hour was celebrated by cheering, music and cannonading. Twenty-five citizens of New Haven, including Congressman Mitchell, Mayor Lewis and other prominent men, met Gov. Cleveland at this place and the Selectmen of the town and leading Democrats made his escort from the Boston & Albany cars to the special train on the Housatonic Railroad. It was with difficulty that a way was made for him through the throng. He seemed greatly pleased by the reception, which was entirely unexpected. When introduced by George N. Dulaney, of the Berkshire Independent Association, as the next President, his attempt to speak was deflected by the cheers of the crowd. He appeared on the platform of the car and bowed his thanks to the enthusiastic crowd. The train moved off with bands playing, cannons firing and great cheering.

CANASAU, CONN., Oct. 30.—At great Barington an immense crowd had assembled. Gov. Cleveland appeared on the rear platform and was received with loud cheering. While the Governor's train stopped here he was greeted by the cheering throngs, and as it moved away three cheers were given for the next President of the United States.

CHATHAM, CONN., Oct. 30.—Gov. Cleveland was greeted by an immense number of people, who crowded to shake him by the hand and to assure him of his final success. The train left the station amid the booming of cannon and the cheers of the vast assemblage.

NEW MILFORD, CONN., Oct. 30.—Great crowds gathered at Canaan Falls village, West Cornwall and Kent, and Gov. Cleveland appeared on the platform of the car at each station. Crowds gathered to grasp him by the hand. There was great enthusiasm all along the route.

BRIDGEPORT, CT., Oct. 30.—Gov. Cleveland arrived in this city by special train at 4:30 p. m., in company with delegates from New Haven and Bridgeport. A crowd of about 2,000 gathered at the depot and a salute of 100 guns was fired on his arrival. He was escorted to the Atlantic Hotel where a reception was held until 1:15, when he left by special train for New Haven. He will return about 9:30 o'clock this p. m., and attend a Democratic rally at Barnum's rink, after which he will take a special train for Albany.

NEW YORK.

Republicans Indicted for Inducement to Register Illegally—A Blaine Reception at Brooklyn.

New York, Oct. 30.—Col. John T. Freeman, founder of a colored Republican association here, was arrested to-day by order of the district attorney on the charge of violating the election laws. The district attorney claims to have received information that colonization was being carried on in the 9th Assembly district. Two colored detectives were put on the case, and after a short time found the work of colonization being carried on by Freeman, and he was arrested. Freeman endeavored to get the detectives to register as living in the district. Attempting to induce men to register illegally is a felony under the present election laws. Joseph Sande, colored, Henry Solomon, George Ostrich and John Stephens, were also arrested on the same charge; indictments having been found against them by the grand jury. They were each held in bail for trial. Freeman was at one time attached to the district attorney's office, and is now employed in the surrogate's office.

New York, October 30.—Six arrests for illegal registration were made in this city to-day.

BROOKLYN, October 30.—Mr. Blaine had an informal reception at the Mansion House in this city this afternoon at which hundreds of people were presented to him. This evening he was given a reception at the Academy of Music by ladies of Brooklyn, which was largely attended, the hall being crowded and many persons turned away. The assemblage was principally composed of women, though a great many men were present. Rev. Dr. Behrens introduced Mr. Blaine, who was warmly received; everybody rising and cheering. Mr. Blaine addressed the assemblage in a brief speech, in which he dwelt upon the strength of influence woman yields in politics, and upon the devotion of woman to the Republican cause and their assistance to the candidate at which he alluded to that literary production which sprang from the pen of a woman, and did so much to concentrate that great army which, in the conflict that came upon the country, destroyed the institution of slavery; and he evoked applause by referring to "that lady whose gifted pen imparted spirit and soul to the anti-slavery agitation when she gave to the world 'Uncle Tom's Cabin.' He said that the great moral strength which inspired the Republican party for its struggles and triumphs has come from the gracious and pure influence of woman.

WASHINGTON.

Hon. Hugh McCulloch—Gen. Greenham Commissioned as Circuit Court Judge.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 30.—The commission of Hon. Hugh McCulloch, as Secretary of the Treasury, was received at the department this morning. The Secretary did not, however, visit the department to-day, but is expected there to-morrow morning to take the oath of office and enter on the discharge of his duties.
Gen. W. Q. Greenham received his commission as Judge of the Judicial Circuit to-day and at once took the oath of office. He will visit his home in Indiana in time to cast his vote for Presidential electors and expects to take his seat on the bench in Chicago on Wednesday or Thursday next.

FOREIGN.

Elections in Germany—Reduction of Wages in Dundee Mills.
(By Cable to the Morning Star.)
BERLIN, Oct. 30.—Election returns, 80 per cent. received, give results in 201 districts. Second ballots will now be taken in 54 districts. The Conservatives have been successful in electing their candidates in 25 districts, the Centre in 44, the National Liberals in 29, the German Liberals in 14, the Alsatians in 13, the Social Democrats in 8, the Poles in 4, the Guelphs in 3, and the People's party in one.

DUNDEE, Oct. 30.—The mill owners have resolved to reduce the wages of operatives 5 per cent. owing to the long continued depression in trade. Thousands of work people are out of employment and the municipal authorities are devising measures of relief.
