LOUISIANA.

U. S. Circuit Court Judge Pardee Refuses to Uphold the Federal Supervisor in his Effort to Disfranchise Democratic Voters in New Orleans.
(By Telegram to the Morning Star.)

New Orleans, October 31.—Judge Pardee, of the U. S. Circuit Court, today heard arguments of the petition filed by S. Supervisor of Elections, George L. Norton, that State Registrar Brewster show cause why 7,235 names of illegal, dead and otherwise disfranchised voters, found on the registration rolls, should not be erased and cancelled. The judge, in deciding the case, said: "I do not know of any statute that confers jurisdiction upon this Court outside of the interests of U. S. supervisors of election and other Federal officers which is to guard. If there was reference in this case to any direct statute of the United States this Court might be of competent jurisdiction; but this is a matter upon which this Court cannot pass. The motion that the State Registrar show cause why these names should not be stricken off is denied."

NEW YORK.

Governor Cleveland's Return to Albany—Arrival of the President and Crew of the Steamship Maasdam, Burnt at Sea.
(By Telegram to the Morning Star.)

ALBANY, Oct. 31.—Gov. Cleveland and party arrived here from Connecticut this morning. The Governor at once resumed his executive duties. To-morrow morning he leaves for New York to review the business men's parade to-morrow evening. He goes to Buffalo on Monday to vote, returning to Albany Tuesday night.

New York, Oct. 31.—The German steamer Rhein, which arrived to-day from Bremen, reports that on October 24, at 7 o'clock in the evening, latitude 49.38, longitude 37.41, she fell in with the Dutch steamer Maasdam, from Rotterdam for New York, which was all ablaze. The Rhein took from her boats, passengers and crew, numbering 186 in all, and brought them to this port.

A Prosperous Business Man of Roanoke County Commits Suicide.

Lynchburg, October 31.—Daniel C. Kiser, one of the most prosperous business men in Southwest Virginia, rode out on his farm near Bonauk to-day and cut his throat with a razor. The cause of the suicide is unknown.

New Bern Journal: A private letter from Snow Hill brings the following news from Greene county: Democrats are gaining ground every day. Wm. A. Darden, for the House, will be elected by a sure majority, and Luby Harper will defeat his man by at least 200 majority.

Charlotte Observer: Our fair yesterday closed its second day and scored a decided success. There was a continual stream of people pouring into the grounds, and they all found an agreeable surprise in the character and extent of the exhibits. It is now pronounced one of the best county fairs ever held in Charlotte, and so it is.

Raleigh News-Observer: Col. B. R. Moore, of Wilmington, carried out to the Exposition yesterday the tail of a fish taken on the waters of the Cape Fear. It was a large one, and was very long. It is said that Charles and Kenner have come to North Carolina to try the electoral votes of this State for Blaine. Who is Kenner? His name has an unsavory memory, not a whit different from his present unsavory business. Asst. Postmaster General Lyman last spring testified before an investigating committee composed about him. He was a Star Route thief.

Goldboro Messenger: A small dwelling on the lands of Mr. Jos. Perry, near Princeton, occupied by Bernie Smith, was destroyed by fire last Sunday night. On Monday S. W. Edwards was arrested on the charge of arson, and while the evidence was only circumstantial, the magistrate thought it strong enough to warrant commitment to jail. St. Paul's new Methodist church in this city has just been furnished with gas, and as soon as the seats can be completed and put in position the hands of the congregation will be thrown open to the congregation, which will be about two weeks.

Weldon News: Rev. J. M. Rhodes, principal of Central Institute, took the school girls to the Exposition last week. We regret to announce the death of Mr. N. H. Hill, which took place at the residence of his daughter, T. N. Hill, Esq., in Halifax on Saturday morning last. On Saturday morning Mrs. Berkeley, wife of Mr. Berkeley, who attends to Mr. Wm. Key's mill, near Garysburg, had an attack of epilepsy, or something of the kind, and fell into the fire. Before assistance could be rendered she was badly burned that she died. She was thirty-one or two years of age.
