

- Mr. S. R. Murkland informs us that he bought a big bill of goods from a New York Republican merchant, who told him that if Cleveland was not elected next Tuesday he would not be required to pay for them, declaring that he had not the slightest doubt of Blaine's defeat.—Lynchburg Virginian, Oct. 31st.

- Washington, Oct. 31.—No more business than is absolutely necessary has been done in the Government departments for several days, and there will be no increase in the work for another week. Hundreds of clerks have already left for their homes, and hundreds more will go between now and Monday night.—N. Y.

- NEW YORK, Oct. 30 .- This morning a special agent was dispatched from the Republican headquarters with a carpet-bag full of greenbacks to corrupt the voters of Indiana, the money being that which was raised last night at the dinner to Blaine. Jay Gould and several of his fellow jobbers came in to-day and doubled their subscriptions.—Baltimore Sun.

- Indianapolis, Ind., Oct. 31.-The Democrats are to-day congratulating themselves over the accession to their ranks of Moses F. Dunn, who will to-morrow deliver a speech at his home in Bedford advocating Cleveland's election to the Presidency. He has been a Radical Republican hitherto, and once made a race for Congress against Dan Voorhees .-Special to Charleston News and Courier.

- Virginia, Florida, and Louisiana are the Southern States in which the money of the jobbers is to be mainly spent. These three States together cast 24 votes in the Electoral College against the 36 votes of New York. In 1880 Virginia gave Hancock a majority of 43,956 in a total vote of 211,996, or 22 per cent. Louisiana gave him a majority of 27,316 in a total vote of 103,304, or 27 per cent. Florida gave him 4,310 majority in a total vote of 51.618, or 8 per cent. These figures show that not one of these States can be classed as a doubtful State.—N. Y. Times.

— New York, Oct. 31.—Millions of fraudulent Cleveland electoral ballots have been printed in this city, under the direction of the Republican National committee, for use in all the Northern States. In these ballots names are misspelled and in many instances fictitious names inserted. Large packages of these ballots were sent to every Western States early in the week. Yesterday four packages of ballots were shipped by the Adams Express Company to the chairman of the Republican State committee in Connecticut for distribution in that State. - Special to Charleston News

and Courier. -Indianapolis, Oct. 31.-Mr. Hendricks came home from Shelbyville last evening, where he spoke to several thousand people. In a brief conversation with the Times's correspondent the Governor said: "The requirements of the cam-paign upon me have been much greater than I had anticipated. There seems to be an unprecedented interest in the coming election, and I have found large outpourings of people everywhere, and all were enthusiastic and in earnest. The Democrats are universally sanguine of victory. For my own part I feel no apprehension. In-

diana is certainly a Democratic State." - Columbus, O., October. 31.-Among the many recent features of the present Presidential canvass in Ohio tending toward the success of the Democracy next Tuesday, the decision of the Supreme Court affirming the unconstitutionality of the Scott Liquor Law must be taken into account. It will have the effect of bringing thousands of German votes to the Democracy who had become alienated since the election of Gov. Hoadly by reason of the dillydallying of the Supreme Court in neglecting to pass upon a statute so clearly illegal as the Scott law. It will also add great strength to the Prohibition vote. The decision of the Court is worth at least 10,-

000 votes to St. John. - Wash. Post. - Below we present to the readers of the Herald the views of a number of members of Congress, other prominent gentlemen and our own well informed correspondents on the probable result of the election on Tuesday. The expressions are mostly confined to what are known as the doubtful States, and generally indicate entire confidence in the success of Cleveland. The enormous Republi-can corruption fund, gathered from the slim purses of government employes and the full pockets of the monopolists, who wine and dine and support the Republican nominee in confident expectation of their reward, is the only thing which excites any fear of the result. In despite of this, however, Indiana is assured; a fusion victory in Michigan seems probable; the German vote in Wisconsin renders that State doubtful, and the Democrats and Independents of Connecticut and New Jersey are confident that, notwithstanding the bribery which has the thinnest veil of concealment, and the open intimidation by manufacturers and other employers practised on their their operatives. Cleveland will receive the electoral votes of those States. New York has ceased to be a doubtful State, and no one now seriously speculates upon it.— Sunday's Herald, Nov. 2.

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


