There was one case of disorderly conduct before the Mayor yesterday morning, which contributed \$3 to the city treasury.

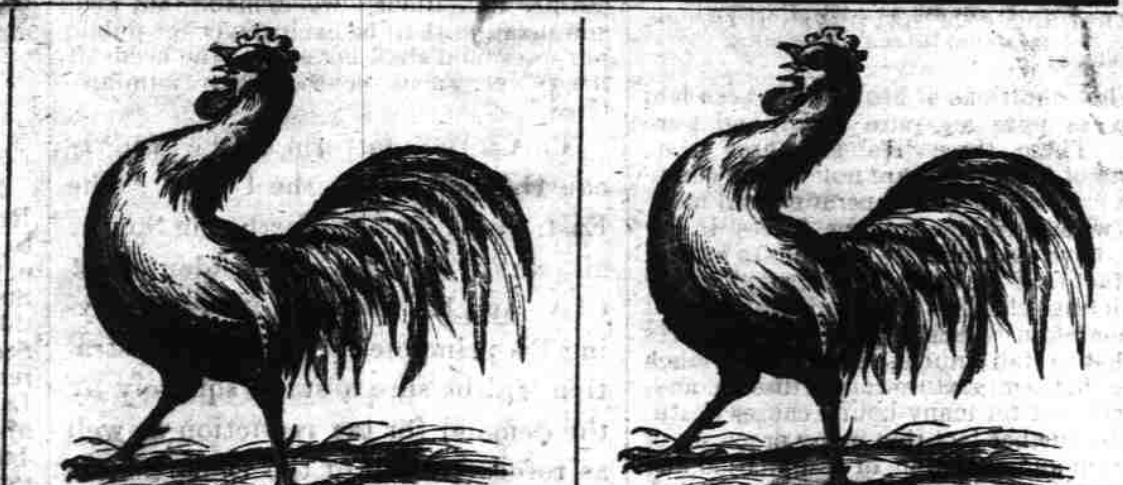
Chickens were plentiful in market yesterday. We counted twenty coops containing an average of thirty chickens in each.
