MORNING EDITION.

OUTLINES.
The official canvass of the electoral vote of the State of New York, complete, gives Cleveland over 1100 plurality. Three warehouses filled with spumac, burned in Petersburg, Va.; loss \$15,000. The Norfolk Works, at Conkingville, N. Y., burned; loss \$40,000. The cotton crop, so far in sight, amounts to 2,929,614 bales. Forty armed men are guarding the court house at Lincoln county, Oregon, to prevent the removal of records until the alleged election fraud is investigated. U. S. Consuls General at London and Paris have been ordered to appoint medical examiners to inspect all vessels leaving England and French ports for this country, with a view of preventing the introduction of cholera. Deaths from cholera in Paris Friday number 56; and in the first twelve hours of yesterday 29. Elkins now admits that Cleveland is elected. Hang him; and not in effigy. Cleveland is big-headed. He wears a 7/8 hat and not 6/8 as published. The Boston Herald beat the New York papers badly. On the 5th inst., it sold 302,000 copies. It is a very superior paper. The papers are discussing the treatment of the negroes by their white allies. The Augusta, Ga., Chronicle says: "Poor deluded negroes will soon learn how their black and white bosses have deceived them. They will learn under a Democratic administration that not one of their civil rights will be impaired or threatened. They ought to learn also that friendship for the Southern whites is their wisest policy as well as their best interest." The fall of Kharطوم and the killing of Gen. Gordon is not believed in London by the Government. The War Department had a dispatch from Gordon dated 26th August, as follows: "Kharطوم—Provisions five months—Shall send Stewart, French, English, Consul, relieve Dongola after destroying Berber. We sincerely trust that the Christian hero is safe." A special from London to the New York Herald, dated 13th, says: "It is expected that Sir Stafford Northcote will next week move in the House of Commons a vote of censure upon the government's Egyptian policy. A belief is still prevalent that a compromise will be effected between the two houses of Parliament, based upon a proposal that the House of Lords shall postpone operation upon the Franchise bill and prevent a suspension of the bill in committee, which will lead to a conference between the government adherents and the opposition on the Redistribution bill. Conservatives of both houses of Parliament will hold a meeting on Tuesday next to consider the situation." We watched pedestrians yesterday as we were on the street and four out of five violated the legal, common-sense rule of taking the right side, going and coming, of the sidewalk. If this rule was not observed in crowded New York locomotion would be impossible. In Wilmington you have to go a zig-zag route, except when you meet two or three big black women and then you must go into the street. How long must these things be?

— One of the features of the procession on the occasion of the approaching Democratic jubilee will be a handsome yacht, containing twenty young ladies, representing the twenty States that voted for Cleveland.

Death of Capt. F. G. Robinson.

Yesterday's Star contained the sad announcement of the death of Capt. Frederick G. Robinson, a well known and highly esteemed merchant of this city, which occurred on Friday night. Capt. Robinson was born in Bennington, Vermont, but removed to this State about the year 1867, residing first at Elizabethtown, Bladen county, and removing to Wilmington about a year afterwards, where he has since remained. When hostilities commenced between the North and the South he was a member of the Wilmington Rifle Guards, and went with that company to Fort Fisher. The company was subsequently merged into the Eighth Regiment, which afterwards became the Eighteenth. At the expiration of the year for which he had enlisted he was discharged, with others, and soon afterwards joined Capt. Tate's company of heavy artillery. After the fall of Fort Fisher he became attached to a company of infantry and in the battle of Bentonville he was captured and sent as a prisoner to Point Lookout, where he remained until the close of the war, when he returned to Wilmington. Since the war he has been engaged in mercantile pursuits, being for a long time connected with the establishment of Messrs. Adrian & Volders. Latterly he has been engaged in the grocery business with his cousin, Mr. N. Robinson. For a number of years he served as Foreman of the Wilmington S. F. E. Company, and for two years filled the position of Chief of the Fire Department. Deceased was also a member of the First Presbyterian Church and of St. John's Lodge of Masons. Deceased was a benevolent, kind-hearted gentleman, and enjoyed the esteem and confidence of all who knew him. The funeral will take place from the First Presbyterian Church this afternoon, at 3 o'clock.

Transparencies, &c.

The German barque *Hestia*, Capt. Boettcher, was cleared from this port, yesterday for Liverpool, by Messrs. Alex. Sprunt & Son, with 3,078 bales of cotton, valued at \$95,000; also the Russian brig *Otto*, Capt. Grant, for Antwerp, by Messrs. Paterson, Downing & Co., with 500 casks of spirits turpentine and 2,306 barrels of rosin, valued at \$9,239; also the schooner *Gertrude L. Trundy*, Capt. Davis, for Paysander, Uruguay, by Mr. Harry Coale, with 885,485 feet of lumber and 5,636 pickets, valued at \$5,776.02. Total \$109,515.
