



Appointments by the President-U. S Consuls General to Appoint Medical Inspectors-Prohibition of the Importation of Rags from Cholera Infected Countries.

(By Telegraph to the Morning Star.) WASHINGTON, November 15 .- The President to-day appointed Otis P. G. Clarke, of Rhode Island, to be Commissioner of Pen-

sions, vice Dudley, resigned, and Calvin B. Walker, of Indiana, at present Second Deputy Commissioner, to be First Deputy Commissioner, vice Clarke, promoted. Secretary McCulloch said recently, in re-

ply to an inquiry on the subject, that he does not deem it expedient to call in any more bonds at present.

The Department of State has directed United States Consuls General at London and Paris to appoint medical inspectors to inspect all vessels leaving English and French ports for this country with, a view of preventing the introduction of cholera.

The Treasury Department to-day issued a circular to customs officers, as foreshown last night, prohibiting the landing in this country of old rags shipped from infected foreign countries after November 20th.
