The German brig Dr. Witte, Capt. Zepline, was cleared from this port for Hull England, yesterday, by Messrs. Alex. Sprunt & Son, with 500 cases spirits turpentine and 2,055 barrels of rosin, valued at \$9,400.

A little colored boy snatched a box of cigars from a shelf in Briggs' drug store, corner of Front and Market streets, last night, but was caught before he could escape with his plunder. The cigars were taken from him and he was turned loose.

It has been suggested that mite boxes be placed in prominent localities to-morrow, and continued there until Thursday, in which to deposit contributions for the Orphan Asylum, the same to be turned over to the various churches on Thanksgiving Day, to be applied as intended.

The Criminal Court for this county, Hon. Oliver P. Meares presiding, will meet in special session in this city to-morrow, having been convened one week in advance of the regular time in order not to conflict with the Superior Court, which meets on the first Monday in December.

RIVER AND MARINE.

The Danish bark Galeon, which was cleared from this port for London on the 14th inst., was through some means omitted from our marine department.

The receipts of cotton at this port for the week ending yesterday footed up 5,227 bales, as against 4,924 bales for the corresponding week last year, an increase of 303 bales.

The receipts for the crop year commencing September 1st to date foot up 61,476 bales, as against 57,027 bales for the same period last year; an increase of 4,449 bales.

The British steamship Carn Marth, Capt. Hurrell, registering 1,174 tons, arrived here from Liverpool yesterday, consigned to Mr. C. F. Mebane. She will load cotton for the above port.
