FORTY-EIGHTH CONGRESS.

SECOND SESSION.

Postmasters' Claims - A Statute for Gen. Lafayette - Petitions Against the Ratification of the Spanish Treaty - The Dakota Bill - Monetary Matters - The Eight-Hour Law - Committees to Witness the Opening of the New Orleans Exposition - The Revenue Marine Service.

SENATE.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 15.-The chair laid before the Senate a letter from the master General transmitting a statement of the claims of postmasters for losses sustained through fire and other causes, for which they were not responsible. Referred.

Mr. Sherman, from the committee on the Library, reported favorably with amendments, a bill providing for the erection of a statue to Gen. Lafayette.

Mr. Logan presented a large number of petitions from tobacco and cigar manufacturers and labor organizations of Illinois, New York and other States, protesting against the ratification of the Spanish treaty. Also, petitions signed by over 7,000 ex-soldiers of the Infantry, praying Congress may purchase for the capitol at Washington a portrait of Gen. George H. Thomas, and recommending that it be executed by Miss Ransom. Mr. Logan said he had seen the picture and considered it an excellent likeness. The papers were appropriately referred.

The chair laid before the Senate Mr. Van Wyck's resolution, heretofore offered, relating to the Spanish treaty, and directing the committee on Library to report a rule providing for the consideration of commercial treaties in open session.

Mr. Miller, of California, said this matter was under the consideration of the committee on Foreign Relations and moved the reference of the resolution to that committee.

Mr. Hoar raised the point of order, that the matter should be considered with closed doors.

Mr. Platt called for a reading of the rule according to the closing of doors.

Rule 25 was read. It provided that on demand of two Senators, the doors of the Senate may at any time be closed.

The Chair inquired whether the motion of the gentleman from Massachusetts (Mr. Hoar) was seconded.

Mr. Hawley seconded the motion, and the Senate then (12.50 p. m.) went into Executive Session.

In fifteen minutes the doors were reopened and further remonstrances were presented against the ratification of the treaty with Spain. Mr. Sherman first inquiring of the chair whether it was proper to present them in open session. The chair held that it was proper, inasmuch as the Senate had already received the seal of secrecy from the treaty itself, and it had been printed.

The Senate then took up the Dakota bill. Mr. Garland submitted a substitute for the bill reported from the committee on Territories. One of the provisions of the substitute provided for submitting to a popular vote the question of dividing the territory. This was desirable, Mr. Garland said, in order to get at the present views of the people of Dakota, and to settle questions arising from the fact that Dakota had a public debt. He cited the embarrassments arising out of the debt controversy between Virginia and West Virginia.

Mr. Harrison objected to the substitute and stated that the question of debt was sufficiently provided for by the committee bill. He would have no objection, however, to an amendment submitting to the people of the territory the question of the division of the territory.

Mr. Vest said the proposal of Mr. Harrison, from newspaper accounts, to be in open rebellion. Were we to admit that turbulent population into the Union? It had been stated in the press that every opponent of the Federal Government was a Democrat. In the light of recent events, Mr. Vest thought the Democrats could assume that responsibility.

The bill was then informally laid aside at the request of Mr. Hill, in order that he might address the Senate on the silver question, apropos of a resolution recently submitted by him declaring it to be the sense of the Senate that there was no reason for the suspension of the coinage of silver dollars or of the issue of silver certificates. When Mr. Hill concluded, debate followed upon the general subject of silver, bi-metallic and silver and gold certificates, participated in by Messrs. Sherman, Williams, Allison and Beck. The matter was then dropped.

The Chair appointed as the committee on the part of the Senate attendants at the Executive Session to-morrow, to take part in the ceremony of opening the New Orleans Exposition, Messrs. Logan, Dolph, Cameron of Penn., Cameron of Wis., Harrison, Miller of Cal., Riddleburger, Henderson, Butler, Vest, Jones of Fla., Slater and Walker.

Adjourned.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

The Speaker laid before the House a communication from the Secretary of the Treasury, estimating the cost of collecting the revenue at each port of entry in the United States, for the fiscal year ending June 30th, 1885. Referred.

Also a communication from the Postmaster General, requesting an appropriation of \$100,000 for postal cards, and \$75,000 for the pay of postal clerks. Referred.

Under the call of States a number of bills, etc., were introduced and referred.

Under the rules of the House, the Speaker proceeded to call committees for motions to suspend the rules.

Mr. Wilkins, of Ohio, from the committee on Banking and Currency, moved to suspend the rules and adopt a resolution relating to the National Bank, for consideration of the McPherson and Dingley bills. After a long debate the motion was agreed to - yeas 174, nays 87; exactly the necessary two-thirds in the affirmative.

Mr. Tracy, of Michigan, from the committee on Coinage, Weights and Measures, moved to suspend the rules and pass the bill prohibiting the issue of Treasury notes of less denomination than \$5, and providing for the issue of \$1, \$2 and \$5 silver certificates.

The motion was lost - yeas 49, nays 216.

Mr. Hopkins, of Penn., from the committee on Labor, reported a resolution requesting from the Attorney General his opinion as to whether the eight-hour law applies to letter carriers. Adopted.

The Speaker attended the following committee to witness the opening of the New Orleans Exposition: Messrs. Mr. Peters, of Kansas, from the committee on Commerce, moved to suspend the rules and pass a bill to promote the efficiency of the Revenue Marine Service. The House refused - yeas 77 to 93 - to second the motion.

Mr. Alton, of S. C., from the committee on Agriculture, moved to suspend the rules and pass a bill to establish a department of agriculture.

Messrs. Blount of Ga., Potter of N. Y., and Browne of Ind., spoke in opposition to the motion, supported by Messrs. Wilson of Ia., Aiken of S. C., Budd of Ala., Hardeman of Ga., and Cox of N. Y. The motion to suspend the rules was agreed to - yeas 166, nays 69. Adjourned.

The City Bank of Schenectady Suspended - Failure in the Importing Trade.

Schenectady, December 15.-The City Bank of Schenectady suspended this afternoon. The bank had a paid up capital of \$100,000 and its last statement showed a surplus of \$15,000 and undivided profits of \$27,091. Charles G. Ellis is president and E. N. Schoonmaker is cashier.

NEW YORK, Dec. 15.-The firm of Henry Levy & Son, importers and manufacturers of fancy goods, at No. 477 Broadway, filed an assignment today for the benefit of creditors, to Wm. H. Gossel, with preferences amounting to \$65,644.

The firm was established in 1844. The failure is said to be the result of business depression. The liabilities are about \$300,000; assets \$325,000.

Pittsburg, Dec. 15.-A freight train on the Pittsburg and Western Railroad ran into a land slide near Geyer's station, thirteen miles from this city, this morning, wrecking the engine and seven cars. Engineer Daniel Castello was killed instantly and fireman John Toterall was injured fatally.
