FOREIGN.

French Successes in Tonquin - The Great Destruction of Life and Pro-

perty by the Earthquake in Spain.

[By Telegraph to the Morning Star.]

PARIS, Dec. 30.—Official advices from Tonquin report that the French forces had advanced from Tuyen Quan; had met the Chinese forces and defeated them, inflicting severe losses upon them. The French loss was trifling.

London, Dec. 30.—A dispatch from Rome to the Exchange Telegraph Company says the offer of Miss Caldwell, of Virginia, to give \$300,000 to found a Catholic University at New York similar to the College Propaganda Fide at Rome, has been submitted to the Pope. His holiness intends to confer a signal mark of distinction upon the lady.

MADRID, Dec. 30.—At Granada to day a to deum was sung and prayers were offered for the cessation of the earthquake.

At Priego, in the province of Cardova, shocks came while the theatre was mowded with people. A terrible panic followed; many persons jumped from the galleries and windows upon the crowd below. Two men were killed outright, and forty were more or less seriously injured. At Malaga works, fell to the earth. The patients in the hospital were so terrified that they forgot for the time being their maladies, and fied to the open air. The convicts in the prison refused to enter their cells, and remained all night in the court yard. Athem and Santa Cruz were completely destroyed. Soldiers are now at work cleaning up the ruins in the search for corpses which are found in large numbers. Many of them are horribly disfigured. The number of persons killed is still unknown. There is no doubt, however, that the report Phere is no doubt, however, that the report in fixed the number at 900 is an exaggeration. There is much distress among the survivors and people are asking for re-lief. At Albunuelas 200 persons received injuries more or less serious. From ruined houses 100 bodies have so far been re-covered. The barracks at Loja, in the province of Granada, were ruined. At Zaffarraya, a town not far from Loja, fifty persons perished.

#### IOWA.

Lynchers Hang a Man for a Crime of which he was Acquitted.

(By Telegraph to the Morning Star.) OTTAWA, December 30.—Pleasant Anderson was hung by eight masked men last night near the town of Blakesburg, in this county, fifteen miles west of here. The causes which led to the lynching are as follows: In November, 1882, near Blakesburg, Chris. McAllister was murdered at his residence. A few months thereafter Pleasant Anderson was arrested for the murder and finally was tried one wear are at Oska. finally was tried, one year ago, at Oska-loosa; the trial lasting two weeks. There was a strong array of circumstantial evi-dence against him, but he was acquitted. The convection prevailed at Blakesburg that he was guilty. Bad feeling prevailed, and last night he was seized at the house of his father-in-law, taken in a sled to a school house, where a mock trial was had before a jury of eight men, and by them he was sentenced to be hung. Nearly a hundred persons had gathered at the school house, among whom Anderson seemed to have no friends, and at about 10.80 o'clock last night they took him to the scene of the murder of McAllister and hung him to the limb of a cottonwood tree. He protested his innocence to the last. The body was left hanging for over two hours, and was finally taken down by the order of a magistrate who went to the scene of the tragedy, and the coroner was sent for. From the temper of the crowd, it was evident that they would brook no interference.

THE COTTON CROP.

December Report of the Department

December Report of the Department of Agriculture.

(By Telegraph to the Morning Star.)

Washington, December 30.—The December report of the Department of Agriculture upon the cotton product indicates a smaller yield that the returns of the condition in October. The October average was 74, against 68 in 1882, 88 in the great harvest of 1882, and 66 in the disastrons season of 1881. Returns of the condition in October and of the product in December have been unusually divergent this year; the first indicated a larger crop than last year, the latter a product slightly less, or about 98 per cant. The comparative decline is in States west of Alabama. The comparison with last year is as follows: North Carolina 100, South Carolina 107, Georgia 101, Florida 108, Alabama 105, Mississippi 94, Louisiana 98, Texas 89, Arkansas 99, Tennessee 101. Applying these per cents. to our figures for the crop of 1883, they indicate a product of 398,000 bales in North Carolina, 502,000 in South Carolina, 760,000 in Georgia, 60,of 898,000 bales in North Carolina, 502,000 in South Carolina, 760,000 in Georgia, 60,000 in Florida, 661,000 in Alabama, 847,000 in Mississippi, 480,000 in Louisiana, 995,000 in Texas, 513,000 in Arkansas, and 314,000 in Tennesses. The remaining territory will probably give about 50,000 bales. This makes an aggregrate of 5,580,000 bales. These figures are provisional, and may be alightly modified by future returns. It is possible that the general disappointment at the outcome of the middle and top crops has made the December returns conservative, but it is certain that the rate of yield will be much below the average. will be much below the average.

One of the letters read: "I committed suicide on account of poverty and incurable sickness. I had no shelter, no bread, no home, no means; and may God help me." Another letter, in the hand writing of the deceased, says that he was born at Franenfeld, Canton Thuryou, Switzerland, March 7, 1841. That he was a son of Baron Joseph Von Rupplin, and that he was ordained a Catholic priest at Buffalo, N. Y. December 17, 1870, by Bishop Stephen Vincent Ryan. The body will be buried from the morgue.
