1st. That the best interests of the State require an amendment to the constitution providing for the appointment of all the judges by the Governor and his council, with the advice and consent of the Senate.

2d. That an amendment to the constitution should be submitted to the people, providing for an increase of the number of justices of the Supreme Court to five.

3rd. That we recommend an increase in the number of Superior Courts in such counties as need greater court facilities, with a provision that some of the terms shall be for the trial of civil cases only, and in our opinion, to meet this require. ment, the number of Superior Court Judges should be increased to fifteen. A constitution was adopted to govern the Association, and the time

Professor Richard A. Proctor, the very eminent English astronomer, gave last night, at the Opera House, to an intelligent and interested audience, the second of his lectures upon that fascinating subject, "Astronomy." It occupied about an hour and three-quarters. 9 He has complete mastery of his subject, and he has a very happy talent to popularize science so as to bring it within the comprehension of a fairly cultivated audience. His speech is rather rapid, and it was with much difficulty that we could follow him at times. To be candid, we found ourselves in a sort of nebulous condition, with a very hazy

understanding of a point here and there.

The topic he handled was "The Sup." and he treated it, if not in an exhaustive manner, and of that we wenture no opinion, at least in a happy, fucid and comprehensive manner. He told his hearers much that they knew and a good deal that they did not know, and he illustrated his lecture with numerous views that served admirably to bring out in clearer light the text of his argument. It was a very agreeable entertainment, and he managed to tell, we may suppose, in less than two hours nearly all that is known of the great luminary in the heavens. It is a treat to hear the most eminent of astronomical lecturers present the riches of his learning and observation and to condense the study of years in the compass of one discussion. We are glad that we have had the privilege of hearing this world-wide distinguished lecturer upon a branch of science that is so engaging. We can now turn again with renewed pleasure to those three remarkably entertaining and richly illustrated papers on "The New Astronomy" that appeared in The Century Magazine in the closing numbers of last year by an eminent astronomer, to whom Professor Proctor referred, we think.
