At the afternoon session there was a long and interesting general discussion of the defects of the court system and of the possible improvements.

On motion of Mr. Geo. H. Snow, Hon. Jos. J. Davis was chosen President of the Bar Association for the present year.

Mr. Davis, in a few well chosen words, said he would undertake any duty that the Bar might desire to impose upon him.

It was resolved, on motion of Mr. W. A. Guthrie, that it is the sense of the Bar Association that the solicitors should be appointed by the Governor, with the consent of the Senate.

REPORT. The committee on the judicial system of the State, to whom were referred various resolutions relating to that subject, respectfully report that they have considered the whole matter and recommend the adoption of the following resolutions:

1st. That the best interests of the State require an amendment to the constitution providing for the appointment of all the judges by the Governor and his council, with the advice and consent of the Senate.

2d. That an amendment to the constitution should be submitted to the people, providing for an increase of the number of justices of the Supreme Court to five.

3rd. That we recommend an increase in the number of Superior Courts in such counties as need greater court facilities, with a provision that some of the terms shall be for the trial of civil cases only, and in our opinion, to meet this requirement, the number of Superior Court Judges should be increased to fifteen.

A constitution was adopted to govern the Association, and the time of holding the annual meeting of the Bar Association of the State was fixed on the first Wednesday after the second Monday in July next, at Raleigh. Hon. J. J. Davis was requested to deliver the address at that time.
