The formal transfer of the Treasury Department to Secretary Manning was made yesterday; Messrs. Bayard, Whitney, Endicott and Garland took the oath of office also.

A woman was arrested in Paris in connection with the recent dynamite outrages in London; letters containing plans for the destruction of public buildings in London, St. Petersburg and Bern were found in her possession.

Gen. Grant's condition has not materially improved. One hundred and twenty-three out of 147 men were killed by a mine explosion in Austrian Silesia.

Cleveland declines to receive persons who call in regard to appointments. A grand banquet was given in Rome Friday in honor of the 75th anniversary of Pope Leo XIII.

New York markets: Money 1 1/2 per cent; cotton dull at 11 1/4; southern flour firm, but rather weak at \$3 30 to \$5 50; wheat, ungraded red 84 @ 2 1/2; corn, ungraded 51 @ 51 1/2; rosin dull at \$1 20 @ 1 25; spirits turpentine dull at \$1c.

Young America is not represented in the Cabinet. The youngest, Mr. Vilas, has passed muster age. He is in his 46th year.

At Tomkinsville, N. J., a cannon exploded on the 4th, by which Joseph Judge was fatally wounded and a dozen others wounded, some very badly.

That bill of abominations, the Blair Federal Pedagogy, did not pass. Sound the loud timbrel! Let it now be laid away in "de archives of gravity."

Gamban prophesied that Blaine would be nominated in 1884 and would be defeated, and that Arthur would be the last in the line of Republican Presidents.

Riddleberger is the worse riddled man that ever hailed from Petersburg or any other station. He is being pilloried for objecting in the Senate to the confirmation of Cleveland's Cabinet. That Riddleberger is not a F. F. V., unless it stands for fault finding Virginian.

The New York Times expects Mr. Cleveland to stand rigidly by his declarations concerning civil service. It says:

The Baltimore and Ohio and Pennsylvania Railroads alone brought from or through Baltimore 105,000 persons on the 4th of March. It is estimated that over 200,000 strangers were in Washington on that day. The railroad management was admirable.

The London Standard says of the Inaugural Address:

"His speech was manly and sensible, but void of ostentatious declarations of Democratic policy. There was nothing tangible in the address, either to condemn or to admire."

The News says:

"His Inaugural Address was full of promise and was worthy of his great personal reputation."

The Berlin correspondent of the London Times not only charges that Bismarck deceived Lord Grantville, but he accuses him of having told a deliberate lie about a certain dispatch. The German papers deny that Bismarck aims to drive Gladstone from power. His son, Count Herbert, has gone to London on a secret mission.

Here is the resolution that the House adopted relative to the assault upon Mr. Richmond Pearson:

"Whereas, it has been made to appear that Richmond Pearson, Esq., a member of this House, has been violently assaulted on this floor, and whereas it is the sentiment of this House that the privileges of its members in debate should not be infringed, and that they should be protected in the exercise thereof, therefore, be it resolved, That a committee of five be appointed to investigate the facts herein set forth, and report to the next meeting of this House."

County Affairs. The Board of Justices of the Peace and Board of County Commissioners for New Hanover county met in joint session yesterday, Justice W. W. Harris presiding; for the purpose of considering the matter of the salary of the County Solicitor, in addition to his regular fees, and on motion of Commissioner Roger Moore the same was fixed at \$100.

Charged With Embezzlement. Albert Isaacs was arrested yesterday on the charge of embezzlement, the warrant having been issued on the affidavit of S. Elfest. It appears that Isaacs was employed by the complainant to sell ginger pop or sarsaparilla for him, and he charges that the defendant fell short \$10 in his returns. He was required to enter into bond in the sum of \$150 for his appearance for preliminary examination to-morrow afternoon at 8 o'clock, which he did and was discharged from custody.

Magistrate's Court. W. T. Laudan had a hearing before Justice Mills yesterday on the charge of cutting the mate of the vessel on which he was employed with a razor, Laudan being the cook. Defendant was required to give bond in the sum of \$100 for his appearance at the next term of the Criminal Court, in default of which he was committed to the Sheriff. One of the deputies went with him to get a friend to sign his bond, and in the meantime he succeeded in effecting his escape, and is now at large.

The interments in the various city cemeteries during the past week were as follows: Oakdale, none; Bellevue, 2 adults; Pine Forest (colored), 2 adults and 3 children. Total 7.

Our Lutheran Visitor—Missionary Matters—Curiosities from India, &c. Rev. W. P. Swartz, Lutheran Missionary to India, who has been on a somewhat protracted visit to this city, has left us. He held services at St. Paul's Lutheran Church three times on Sunday last, and on Monday he organized a Lady's Missionary Society, with forty members. It is called the Mengert Missionary Society, in honor of the first pastor of the church here, who was himself at one time a missionary to India.

Church on the 4th inst., for the purpose of organizing a "Preachers' Meeting," to be held in Wilmington and its vicinity, when the following proceedings were had, as furnished by Rev. R. C. Campbell, secretary:

The house was called to order by Rev. J. G. Fry, P. E., of the Wilmington District of the A. M. E. Church. Rev. A. W. Al-lerston began the devotional exercises by reading and singing hymn 1st in Hymn book. Rev. A. M. Conway led in prayer. After which Rev. R. C. Campbell, of Trinity M. E. Church, read the 2d chapter of Acts. Rev. J. G. Fry then followed by reading hymn 241, which was sung by the congregation, after which he announced the object of the meeting. It was moved that an election of officers be had. On motion, the officers of this Association shall hold their offices for twelve months.

Temperance Mass Meeting. The Bible Union Temperance Society will hold a public mass meeting this evening, at 8 o'clock, at the colored Baptist Church, corner of Seventh and Red Cross streets.
