CITY HOSPITAL.

Report of the Chairman of the Hospital Board-The Surgeon in Charge, &c.-Increase in Efficiency, Popu-

The reports of the officials of the City Hospital, showing the operations of that institution for the past year, indicate a very encouraging state of affairs and reflect great credit upon the Surgeon in charge and the managers.

The report of Col. Roger Moore, Chair man of the Hospital Board, says: "De W. W. Lane, Superintendent and Surgeon, is still in charge, and devotes his entire time and skill to the treatment of the sick and the economical management of the Hospital. Under his management the institution is growing in popularity and usefulness, the admissions the past year showing a large increase over the year 1883, and the increased amount from pay patients isgratifying."

According to this report, the total number of admissions for treatment was 181, of which 158 were successfully treated and 28 died. Included in the total number treated were 12 pay patients. The total expenditures for the year were \$5,784.14, of which amount \$2,890.88 was for permanent improvements, including new wing, laundry, wood-house, sewerage and repairing kitchen, leaving a balance of \$2,893.26 for operating the hospital. Receipts from pay patients and other sources \$283.35, leaving \$2,609.91 as net cost for operating expenses, or a monthly average of \$217.49 as against 187.98 for 1888, with 126 tota] admissions, showing an increase of 40 per cent. in admission, and only 16 per cent. in expenditures. The new wing is built in a peat and substantial manner, and is divided into two wards, one for males and the other for females, being supplied with dispensary, oferating room, bath rooms and water closets. Sewerage pipes have an added, and connection made with the

cooking.

The report of Dr. Lane, Surgeon in charge, commends the action of the Board of Managers in increasing the facilities of the Hospital; says our city physicians have taken great interest in the institution; compliments the employes and attendants; alludes to the urgent necessity for a mortuary or dead house, for purposes of post mortem examinations for the benefit of scientific medicine, etc.; alludes in terms of gratitude to the kindness and assistance he has received at the hands of city physicians, and also from Dr. Peckham, of the U. S. Ma rine Hospital, and to the visits of the Sis. ters of Charity of the Catholic Convent, the Sisters of St. James' Home and other ladies.
