Executive Business—Contingent Expenses, Etc. WASHINGTON, March 31.—At 12.55, after the reading of the journal, Mr. Cameron moved that the Senate proceed to the consideration of executive business.

Mr. Van Wyck asked the Senator to withhold that motion for a few moments, so he might submit a report from the committee on Mississippi River improvement.

Mr. Cameron insisted upon his motion. Mr. Van Wyck desired to make a statement. "Not debatable," said Mr. Cameron.

Thereupon the motion to go into executive session was carried. At 12.50 p. m. the doors were reopened. The resolution offered by Mr. Allison was called up and agreed to, as follows:

Resolved, That the following resolution, adopted by the Senate July 5th, 1854, namely: that the Senators and their families be authorized and directed to rent and prepare suitable rooms outside of the Capitol, is hereby rescinded, to take effect on the adjournment of the Senate.

Mr. Van Wyck asked how much would be the probable expenses of the committee. Mr. Allison said that it was not intended that any expense should be incurred.

Mr. Sherman called attention to the fact that he had introduced for the consideration of the committee to sit during the recess, and he would not press it now, in the hope that this committee proposed by Mr. Allison would reach the desired end.

After remarks by Messrs. Plumb and Sherman, in criticizing the House of Representatives for alleged extravagant expenditure, the resolution of Mr. Allison was adopted.
