Executive Business - Contingent Ex-

penses, Etc. WASHINGTON, March 31.-At 12.52, after the reading of the Journal, Mr. Cameron moved that the Senate proceed to the consideration of executive business.

At 12.20 p. m. the doors were reopened. The resolution offered by Mr. Allison was called up and agreed to, as follows:

adopted by the Senate July 5th, 1884, namely: that the Sergeant-at-Arms and Architect of the Capitol be and they are hereby authorized and directed to rent and prepare suitable rooms outside of the Capi-tol, is hereby rescinded, to take effect on the adjournment of the Senate. WASHINGTON.

Mesignations Called for in the Treasury Bepartment-Higgins' Appoint. ment-The New Minister to Chili. [By Telegraph to the Morning Star.1

WASHINGTON, March 31.-Secretary Manuing has called for the resignation of First Auditor Reynolds, Second Auditor Ferris, Fourth Auditor Beardsley, Fifth Auditor Alexander, and Second Comptroler Uptos, to take effect on the appointment and qualification of their successors, who will be nominated to-morrow or Thursday. All the above named officials have accordingly resigned. It is understood that immediate changes are also contemplated in the office of the Register of the Treasury Commissioner of Customs, and Deputy First Comptroller. It is is also intimated that Assistant Secretary Coon will resign shortly and engage in private business.

Secretary Manning to-day appointed lugene Higgins, of Baltimore, to be Chief of the Appointment Division of the Treasury Department, to take effect April 2nd vice C. S. Trevltt resigned. His services as an employe under the appropriation for the detection of offenders upon the customs revenue will be dispensed with from to-day. Wm. R. Roberts, of New York, who was to day nominated for the Chilian mission, is 55 years of age, and has resided in New York city for the past forty years. In 1876 he retired from business, having amassed a large fortune in mercantile busiuess in New York city. Mr. Roberts was elected to the 42d and 43d Congresses and declined the renomination to the 44th Congress. During his term of service in Congress he opposed what was known as the "Back Pay" bill.

The French Commander in Tonquin Cailing for Reinforcements-Chinese Successes-Alarm in Paris. (By Cable to the Morning Star.)
