New Berne Journal: Last Saturday evening Mr. Geo. N. Ives' sloop Favonia left New Berne for the Roanoke marshes, and on Monday afternoon took a cargo of 900 shad and 4,000 herrings.

Bishop Lyman confirmed 6 whites and 7 colored at Charlotte, and 7 at Long Creek Mission, ten miles from there. The Observer says: This mission was organized only last October, but twenty-two persons have already been confirmed, most of them heads of families.

Durham Reporter: Peter Winfrey, a colored man employed at the Hotel Claborn, died suddenly last Sunday. He had been complaining for several days but continued to go about. Groaning was heard in a room he occupied in rear of the Mangum block, where he was found in an unconscious state and he died soon after.

Raleigh News-Observer: Rev. John R. Caswell, colored, died suddenly at 1 o'clock yesterday morning. He was about 48 years of age and was quite a prominent colored man, whose influence was always for good.

Rockingham Rocket: Died, near Rockingham, on the 1st inst., Mrs. R. J. Hasty, aged 24 years. Died, in Wolf Pit township, on the 29th ult., Mrs. Mary Freeman, widow of the late Wm. Freeman, Esq., and sister of Maj. R. T. Long, aged 71 years of age.
