ed For-Body Found Floating in the

Yesterday, about noon, the body of Evander McBride, a prominent colored man of this city, was found floating in the river near the W. & W. R. R. wharf. Deceased disappeared from his home on Dickinson's Hill, in the northern part of the city, on Saturday last, since which time detectives have been employed in the effort to discover his whereabouts. He was a member of the colored Masonic order, and the fraternity took much interest in the search for the missing man. They buried the remains in Pine Forest Cemetery with the honors of the order.

McBride was a blacksmith by trade and was the owner of some property. He was about 56 years of age. Some eighteen months ago his wife was sent to an insane asylum, and his friends say he has never been right since.

Coroner Jacobs was notified, and a jury of inquest was held, a verdict being returned that deceased came to his death from some cause to the jury unknown.
