It is now the belief of Gen. Grant's attendants that he will survive the summer. Mr. Kelley will resign his position as Minister to Russia, in place of Gen. Lawton. Grundy, the county seat of Buchanan county, Va., has been burned. The cotton crop, so far in sight, amounts to \$5,506,890 bales. James Q. Chenoweth, of Texas, has been appointed First Auditor of the Treasury, vice R. M. Reynolds. Judge Andrew Wylie, Associate Justice of the Supreme Court of the District of Columbia, has resigned. British consuls at Woolwich have been ordered to load stores for India; the Cabinet council sat three and a half hours yesterday. It is understood the Afghan situation has not improved. The Canadian forces under Gen. Middleton fought Riel's insurgents at Fish Creek; the Canadians retired with a loss of twelve killed and forty-seven wounded. Thomas Little, a wealthy planter, was assassinated at his home at Cortland, Ala.; his brother-in-law is in jail, charged with the crime. It also considered the case of Mr. Kelley, of Richmond, who had asked to follow Mr. Lawton's example. It is semi-officially stated that the Cabinet also considered the objections raised to Mr. Jackson as Minister to Mexico, and that it is probable that no commission will ever be issued to him."

The Raleigh Recorder tells a pleasant anecdote of the noble and knightly Lee in which the great soldier is made to refer to two young women, his nieces, as having "been well raised." We doubt if he said this. Gen. Lee would never have used "raised" in connection with two fine young women. Never. We have taken our friend at his word. The Prince and Princess of Wales have visited Belfast and had "a big time." Base Ball Matters.

Now that the Base Ball season is fairly opened, as preparations for the various cup-tests are concerned, the following schedule, which has been submitted to each club in the association and adopted, will be of interest. Raleigh plays at Wilmington May 20th and 21st; July 23rd and 24th. With Goldsboro May 26th and 27th; July 29th and 30th. With Durham June 4th and 5th; August 6th and 7th. With Oxford June 7th and 8th; August 11th and 12th. Wilmington plays at home with Raleigh May 5th and 6th; July 7th and 8th. With Goldsboro June 3rd and 4th; August 1st. With Durham June 9th and 10th; August 8th and 10th. Oxford June 16th and 17th; August 18th and 14th. Goldsboro plays at home with Raleigh May 7th and 8th; July 9th and 10th. With Wilmington May 18th and 19th; July 16th and 17th. With Durham June 6th and 8th; August 11th and 12th. With Oxford June 20th and 22nd; August 10th and 17th. Durham plays at home with Raleigh May 12th and 13th; July 13th and 14th. With Goldsboro May 28th and 29th; July 23rd and 24th. With Oxford June 23rd and 24th; August 18th and 19th. Oxford plays at home with Raleigh May 14th and 15th; July 15th and 16th. With Wilmington May 25th and 26th; July 21st and 22nd. With Goldsboro May 30th; June 1st; July 25th and 27th. With Durham June 11th and 12th; August 4th and 5th. The championship will be decided by the official scorer, and will be awarded to the club winning the largest number of regular schedule games. No "exhibition" game will be taken into consideration. The Raleigh club will make the first trip from home, and will be followed by the Wilmington club &c., as named in the schedule.

Fatal Railroad Accident.

We learn from a special dispatch to the Charlotte News and Courier that the northern bound freight train of the Wilmington, Columbia & Augusta Railroad collided with the material train at Eastover Thursday evening about half past 8 o'clock, running into the material train, which had side-tracked there for the night, the switch having been left open. Engineer S. C. Jenson, of engine No. 72, deserves much credit for his action. On finding he had left the straight line and entered the side track he immediately blew brakes, reversed his engine and pulled her open, retaining his seat and displaying much presence of mind. His fireman jumped. Capt. T. F. Toon is conductor of the freight train. Capt. Griffin, conductor of the material train, states positively that he had the switch closed when he finished his work and entered the turnout, and he is satisfied that the switch was opened by parties unknown to him. One of the material hands, Nelson Brown, was killed immediately and the leg of Paul Coleman, of the same train was broken below the knee. Engineer Ham was in his shanty, saw the train coming and jumped, thereby saving his life, as the three shanties were completely wrecked. Engine No. 72 is entirely disabled and has to be hauled to the shops. One of the flat cars loaded with sand was driven half way into one of the shanties.
